GAMBRIA ERECT!!

Failure of the Firm of David Wilmot, & Co.

The Democracy of Cambria achieved a victory yesterday of which they may well be proud. They not only rolled up an old-fashioned Democratic majority for Packer and the rest of the State ticket, but in spite of all the efforts of the disorganizers they also succeeded in electing the entire county ticket by handsome majorities.

Wm. F. Packer our candidate for Governor, is elected by about 30,000 of a majority over Wilmot the woolly head candidate. The rest of the State ticket is also elected. We have also secured both branches of the Legislature by large majorities.

Agricultural Fair.

The third annual exhibition of the Cambria county Agricultural Society, opened on last Wednesday and closed on Friday evening. The attendance during the first day was small, and fears were entertained that the fair would prove a failure; but the attendance during the two next days was very large, and we can truly say that the exhibition was one of which the people of Cambria might well be proud.

The exhibition of Horses and Horned Cattle was excellent, and we believe all in attendance were willing to admit, that Cambria is better adapted for the rearing of good draught Horses, than any other county in the State. There was a large stock of Poultry on exhibition, which we are confident could not be beat for size, beauty and crowing, this side of Texas.

An Address was delivered before the Society on Friday afternoon, by WILLIAM A. STOKES, Esq., of Greensburg. Mr. Stokes is an orator in the true sense of the term. He made a number of practical suggestions in his address which the farmers present would do well to remember, and carry into practice in the management of their farms.

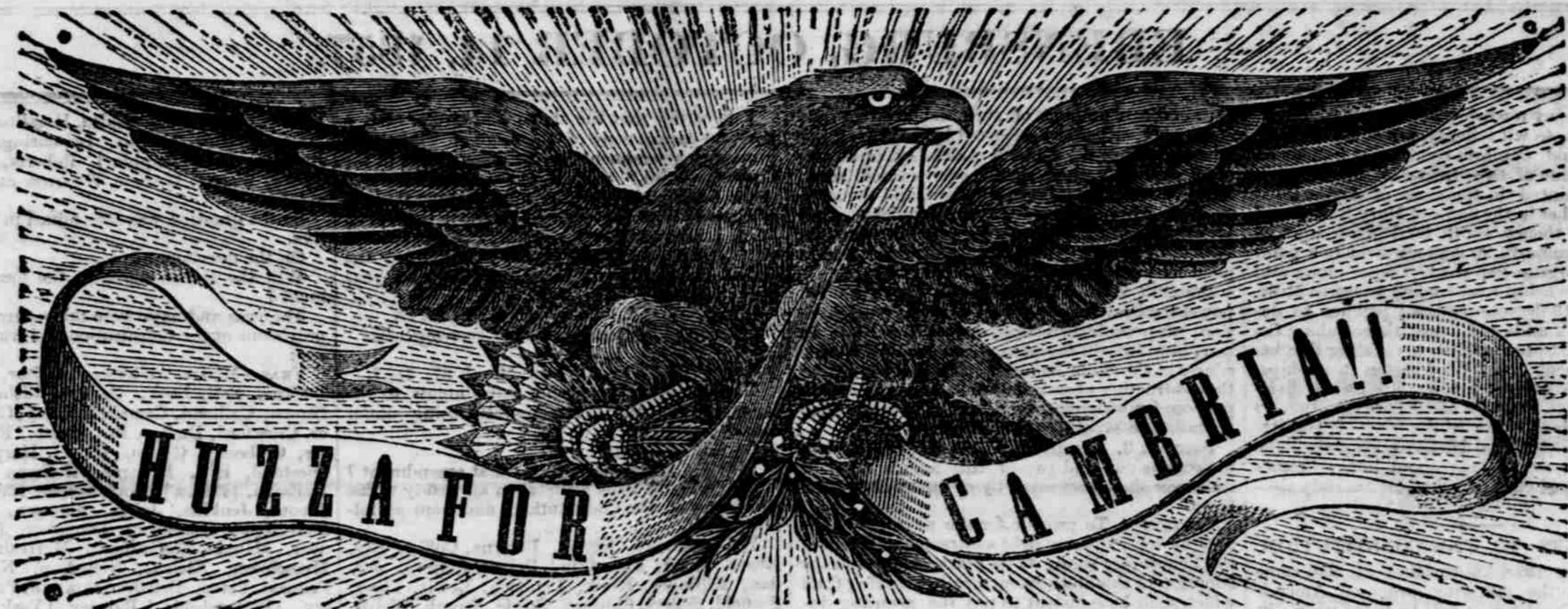

GLORIOUS VICTORY!!

From the above official vote it will be seen that Packer's majority in Cambria is 1337 over Wilmot and 1172 over both Wilmot and Hazlehurst. This majority is on a vote less by 1173 than was polled in the county at the Presidential Election. The majority for Gen. Packer may be regarded as a test vote, and we think that it places Cambria in the right position for years to come. We have elected our whole county ticket, which is a warning to all bogus Democrats, who may be disposed to try their hands at volunteering against regular nominations.

Huzza for Cambria!

By the official returns it will be seen that Cambria has nobly done her duty, by rolling up a Democratic majority for PACKER of 1337! and electing the whole County ticket. This has been accomplished, notwithstanding there was not a full turn out of the voters, which makes the victory more glorious. The whole number of votes polled was 3586, being 1173 votes less than were polled at the Presidential election last year, when the vote was 4759, of which Mr. Buchanan had a majority of 1322! It will thus be seen that upon a reduced vote in the county, the Democratic majority has been increased. Again we say all honor to the indomitable democracy of "little Cambria."

The Election.

From the returns received, we have no doubt that Gen. PACKER's majority over WILMOT and HAZLEHURST is at least 30,000. PACKER's majority over Wilmot may reach 60,000.

STRIKLAND's majority for Canal Commissioner and THOMPSON and STOKES's majority for Supreme Court Judges, will be about the same as PACKER's. We have no doubt that the Amendments to the Constitution have been carried by a very large majority. This is a good days work for Pennsylvania which has been redeemed from the misrule of Know-Nothingism and effectually routed the Black-Republicans.

Glorious Result in Georgia!

A DEMOCRATIC MAJORITY OF 12,000. The news from Georgia comes in glorious. The election, held on the 5th inst., has resulted in the triumphant success of the Democracy.

Judge BROWN, the Democratic candidate has been elected Governor by from 10 to 12,000 majority, and six of the eight members of Congress elect are Democrats—being a gain of one member.

A General Stay-Law.

If the Banks, says the Philadelphia Argus, which have violated the law of the State without the slightest necessity for doing so, producing general embarrassment and distress without any cause but that of their own interest or convenience—if they and the cattle and flour speculators, the grain and sugar monopolists, the note shavers whom they have accommodated with enormous facilities for carrying on their nefarious and abominable traffic—if they are to be relieved by the Legislature of the just consequences of their madness, recklessness and wickedness. Let there not only be a general abrogation of all penalties for crime, but a general suspension of all laws for the collection of debts. Why not? Why should one class of debtors (the most worthless too) be exempted from their obligations, and every other class be compelled to pay what they owe? Let us not make fish of one and flesh of another. Let us make Legislative action general, not special—embracing the whole people, not a privileged few. Let us go into universal bankruptcy, and never pay any more debts as long as we live. Promise as much as we like, but abrogate all legal authority to compel us to redeem. Let us have a universal credit system founded upon banking principles. Let our Sheriffs and Constables resign, and all collection of debts be declared legally impossible.

Death of the Hon. Louis M'Lane.

This venerable statesman died at his residence in Baltimore on Wednesday last. Mr. M'Lane was a man of incorruptible purity of

character and great ability. He enjoyed the confidence of the Democratic party, and has fulfilled many high public trusts. Mr. McLane was Secretary of State, and also Secretary of the Treasury during the Administration of General Jackson, succeeding Mr. Van Buren in the State Department. He was subsequently sent as Minister to England by President Jackson, whose confidence and intimacy he enjoyed to as great an extent as any other person. During the Administration of Mr. Polk, Mr. McLane was also Minister to England, and negotiated the treaty settling the Oregon question with Lord Aberdeen.

Mr. McLane was a man of spotless purity of character in private life, and held an exalted station for statesmanship among the distinguished public men of the period. Mr. McLane was the son of Col. McLane, of Delaware, one of the prominent leaders in the Revolutionary War. At the time of the admission of Missouri, Mr. McLane was Senator from Delaware, and strongly opposed the so-called Compromise as unconstitutional, and his speech on that subject gained him the warm friendship of Gen. Jackson.

He was seventy-three years of age at the time of his death.
