CAMBRIA ERECT!!

Failure of the Firm of David Wilmot, & Co.

The Democracy of Cambria achieved a victory yesterday of which they may well be proud. They not only rolled up an old fashioned Democratic majority for Packer and the rest of the State ticket, but in spite of all the efforts of the disorganizers they also succeeded in electing the entire county ticket by handsome majorities. George N. Smith has been nobly sustained by his constituents. We ask that officious intermeddling demagogue, G. W. Bowman, to examine the official returns for Assembly in this county, confident that when he has done so, he will hang his head in shame, if he is not absolutely impervious to that emotion. The struggle is now over, and we ask who has been sustained? George W. Bowman or George N Smith? The official returns answer the inquiry in language not easily misunderstood.

Wm. F. Packer our candidate for Governor, is elected by about 30,000 of a majority over Wilmot the wooly head candidate. The rest of the State ticket is also elected. We have also secured both branches of the Legislature by large majorities. The Demoeracy of Blair county have elected Dr. Christy their candidate for Assembly by about 200 of a majority. This is a victory of which our neighbors may well be proud. The vote in the State was small and will probably fall 50 000 short of that east at the presidential

contest last fall.

Agricultural Fair.

The third annual exhibition of the Cambria county Agricultural Society, opened on last Wednesday and closed on Friday evening .-The attendance during the first day was small, and fears were entertained that the Pair would prove a failure; but the attendance during the two next days was very large, and we can truly say that the exhibition was one of which the people of Cambria might well be proud.

The exhibition of Horses and Horned Cattle was excellent, and we believe all in attentdance were willing to admit, that Cambria is better adapted for the rearing of good draught Horses, than any other county in the State. There was a large stock of Poultry on exhibition, which we are confident could not be beat for size, beauty and crowing, this side of Texas. The vegetable department attracted not a little attention. The display of Apples, Peaches, Turnips, Potatoes, Grain, &c., was quite creditable, and proved conclusively that this is emphatically an Agricultural Region. The Ladies' Department was well represented. The display of needlework, consisting of Quilts, Embroideries, &c., was large, and well calculated to show that the daughters of Cambria are models of industry and good taste.

An Address was delivered before the Society on Friday afternoon, by WILLIAM A. STOKES, Esq., of Greensburg. Mr. Stokes is an orator in the true sense of the term .-He made a number of practical suggestions in the management of their farms.
