LATER FROM YUCATAN.—The Havana papers have received dates from Laguna and Sinal on the 14th ultimo. It is reported that the revolution at Campeche had returned in obedience to the Government, and the reported bombardment of Sinal proves to be false.

A man has been committed to jail, at Stafford, for various cases of imposture. On one occasion he represented himself to a woman as her husband, who had been transported fifteen years before, and she, though married again, was so completely convinced that the prisoner was her long-lost partner, that she left the man she had married, and went to live with the prisoner. He played a similar deception on another woman.

A VETERAN EDITOR.—The Pittsburg Sun has been conducted for fifty-seven years by its present editor, the Hon. Phineas Allen. The Sun was first issued in 1800, as an advocate of the political doctrines of Thomas Jefferson, and it has continued steadily in the regular Democratic faith to the present day.

LIVES LOST BY ACCIDENTS IN 1857.—The year now past away seems to have been a favored one in respect to fatal accidents. The number of lives lost by fires in this country during the year is put down at 158, and 183 for the previous year. From steamboat accidents 322 have been killed and 127 wounded.

THE DEMOCRATIC CAUCUS NOMINATIONS.—HARRISBURG, Jan. 5.—The Democratic members of both Houses have been engaged this evening, in selecting candidates for the various offices to be supported tomorrow in the election required to complete their organization.

LATER FROM MEXICO.—NEW ORLEANS, Dec. 25.—The steamship Tennessee has arrived here with semi-monthly mails from Mexico. The Tennessee left the city of Mexico on the 17th inst. The country was again in an agitated condition, caused by a new revolutionary movement, designed to dissolve the Congress, and to overthrow the recent Constitution made, declaring Comofort Dictator of Mexico, and granting him extraordinary powers.

Later advices from Yucatan are also furnished. The country continued distracted by civil war. Sinal, which at the previous date was in possession of the Campeche troops, and in a state of blockade, had been captured by the Revolutionists; but it was again retaken by the former, and a strong force of good troops were stationed at that point to defend it from further assaults.

A letter was received on Monday, by Rev. Murray A. Abbott, says the Newark (N. J.) Mercury, announcing the death of Rev. Mr. Freeman and wife, who went out to India in the Missionary service some time since. They were taken prisoners by the natives, and after being kept in confinement for some days were led out to execution, leading a quiet life in blood. About the middle where they were beheaded, blood had collected in such quantities as to smother the several heads of previous victims, against which they stumbled as they walked.

Later News from Europe—Arrival of the Niagara.

BALTIMORE, January 2.—The Concord steamship Niagara arrived early this morning, bringing Liverpool dates to Saturday, 19th ult. The Niagara sailed for Boston after a very short detention, and will be due in Boston on Sunday afternoon. Her mails will reach Philadelphia on Monday evening.

The general news are not very important. There is no later news from India. The cotton market closed dull, with a considerable decline in prices. Breadstuffs quiet and generally unchanged. Provisions dull.

The London money market was slightly easier; consols for account quoted at 92½ and 92¼. The bullion in the Bank of England shows a large increase. The Bank of France has reduced the rates of discount to 3 per cent; the commercial crisis in the north of Europe continues severe. Affairs in Hamburg are improving. Messrs. Parrell & Son, London, is reported as failed. The London discount houses are easier, and the applications to the bank are light. The financial troubles among the wool manufacturers continue. Messrs. Cheesborough & Sons, of Yorkshire, have failed, and other failures are expected.

France has imposed a duty on foreign brandies. A further ineffectual attempt has been made to launch the Levantian steamer. The American Submarine Company are said to have abandoned the attempt to raise the sunken ships at Sebastopol. Liverpool, Dec. 18.—The sales of cotton for the week has been 28,000 bales, closing with a declining tendency. Holders are pressing on the market. Prices show a decline of half a penny particularly for the new crop. The estimated sales on the day of the sailing of the Niagara are 3,000 bales, and the same 1600 were to speculate, and the same to exporters. The market was quiet with rather a better demand. The stock in port 387,000 bales, of which 185,000 are American. The Manchester advices are unfavorable.
