PROCLAMATION OF GOVERNOR CUMMING.

GREEN RIVER COUNTY, NEAR FORT BRIDGER. Utah Territory, November 21, 1857

To the people of Utuh Territory : On the 11th of July, 1857, the President appointed me to preside over the Executive Department of this Territory. I arrived at this point on the 17th of this month, and shall probably be detained some time in consequence of the loss of animals during the recout snow storms.

I will proceed at this point to make the preliminary arrangement for the temporary ofganization of the Territorial government.
