AN ORDINANCE.—Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the borough of Carrollton, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, that hereafter, no person or persons shall be allowed to hitch any horse or gelding, or any other animal, within eight feet of the outside limits of the street, on either side of the street, in said borough of Carrollton. Provided however, that any person or persons may erect hitching posts for the purpose of hitching horses or other animals, eight feet from the outside of said street, and any person or persons violating the provisions of this ordinance shall be subject to a fine of fifty cents, to be recovered according to the provisions of the several acts of Assembly relative to boroughs, in such cases may and provided.
