Was it not by this sign that they conquered? Look now at the North. The noble Democratic state convention of Ohio—the zealous democracy of Maine—the gathering hosts of our free states, are all planting themselves on this national platform.

They consider themselves as members of a great national party. Now go to these States and say to their Democracy, you have the "semblance" only of a national party—you have lost the reality, and the reply would be likely to be, that even the suggestion was a libel on their intelligence and patriotism.

Again: the vote that placed President Buchanan in office, came from every State and every locality in the Union. There was no semblance here surely. A national party and none other did the work.

By whom was the deed done? Is it meant to be understood that the measures of President Buchanan are not national? Such is not the judgment passed on them by the true democrats north and south, east and west.
