THE RETURNS

AGRICULTURAL FAIR.

REPUBLICAN POLICY.—The following resolutions recently adopted by a Republican convention in Vermont, show the ultimate policy contemplated by the Republicans and their abolition leaders.

Resolved, That we have but one object in view—the immediate liberation of the slave. We pronounce that statesmanship to be truly wise which leaves the freedom of the slave as a right, that patriotism to be hollow which seeks to break his letters, and that policy to be spurious which does not hail him as a man and a brother.

Resolved, That we shall allow nothing to pass between the slave and his emancipation—neither pacificators nor compromisers, neither constitutions nor Union, but we shall proceed through them all, or over them, as we may, by no means intimidated by a majority, as we may, and place him, redeemed and unshackled, upon the world-wide platform of a common humanity.

Resolved, That we register our testimony against the American Church, the popular religion, and the Government of the United States, because by their deliberate consent and cooperation four millions of our fellow-countrymen are held in their galling chains of bondage, whose emancipation is registered by them with exceeding cowardice of spirit and majority of purpose.

The above incendiary and fanatical resolutions express the true sentiments of this dangerous party. They are the reflex of the sentiments of Lovejoy, Lincoln and Garrison, with, though stated in stronger language, simply because that particular "spirit" has been thoroughly abandoned. There are localities in Illinois where they would be vigorously applauded.

This party boldly avows itself opposed to all laws not enacted upon the principles of negro equality. They will respect no other arrangements for compromise, neither constitutions nor Union, that do not recognize the negro as being on a level with white men—Nay, farther than this, they will rise over everything, "appalled by us danger," if they succeed in placing him upon the level of "common humanity."

Citizens of Illinois, what do you think of such declarations? Is it not time to arouse to action? This Vermont declaration has hundreds and thousands of supporters in Illinois. One of their distinguished leaders has boldly avowed himself in favor of this odious doctrine of negro equality, and proclaims that this Union cannot exist permanently "half slave and half free."—Register.

How TO PRESERVE GRAPES.—The following method of preserving grapes for winter use we copy, as communicated to the American Agriculturist.

When they are fully ripe, suspend the basket by a strap, or cord passed around the neck, merely giving liberty to both hands for picking, with one hand hold the cluster, and with the other, remove it from the vine, remove from the clusters all unripe and decayed fruit, and deposit them in the basket and it is filled.

Use a market basket that will hold about half a bushel. Carry the grapes thus gathered to the place for packing in boxes, about two feet square, with covers made to fit tight. In packing, lay a newspaper on the bottom of the box, then a layer of grapes, then a paper and second layer of grapes, which, when closely packed, fills the boxes in some dry, airy place, with the cover off, and let the box remain open for ten days, or until the sweating process is past; then close the box and set them in the fruit-room, cellar or garret, any place where they will not freeze, or which is not extremely damp.

Grapes packed as above directed, will open at any time during the winter or spring following, as fresh as when packed. The only secret or mystery is, that the moisture which soaks the fruit, when packed in saw-dust and other absorbents, passes off during the ten days that the box remains open, instead of being absorbed, and ultimately moulding and spoiling them. So perfect has been my success, that I have more confidence in the preservation of the grape than any other fruit.

I use shallow boxes for packing grapes, and the moisture may more readily escape, and that the first layer in the bottom may not be crushed by the weight above.
