THE CALIFORNIA CONGRESSIONAL ELECTION.

A question will likely be brought forward during the next session of Congress, the merits of which it is well every one should understand before-hand, in order that no one may be misled by the misrepresentations which will be made by the Opposition. The Legislature of California passed, at its last session, an act postponing the time for the Congressional election, which that body had a legal and constitutional right to do. The regular Democracy abided by the law and made no nominations; but the Opposition, Messrs McKim and Stewart, who, not being opposed, were of course elected. There can be no doubt that had the Democracy made nominations, their candidates would have been successful, as they elected their Judge and Comptroller; but being lawfully and lawfully sustained citizens, says the Constitution, they chose to postpone their election until the period fixed by law. We should not be surprised, however, if McKim and Stewart should come in at the next Congress, and claim their seats under an election thus clearly illegal—nor should we be surprised either, if every Black Republican in Congress shall vote for their admission, in order to illustrate the beautiful workings of the "Higher Law" doctrine, as expounded by William H.
