Mr. Jahn M. Guthrie returned from Salt Weekly Platte Argus the following account of the horrible sufferings which he and his ompanions endured from the cold weather on the plains and the mountains : Mr. Guthrie left Salt Lake City on the

The November, with the mail on packed minals, in company with G A. Beardly, of New York. It had been snowing for seven a eight days before Mr. Guthrie left the The snow was from one to six feet deep in the Big Mountains, and they had to timp the snew to pass with their animals.— Second day out the snow was so deep that the company got lost and lay out all night, and the men in charge of the mail had their feet nd hands frozen, and the boots had to be st of their feet the next morning,

The third day they made Bridger about gaset and after traveling twenty miles got let sgain, and were again compelled to lay down in the snow until morning. Fourth by they made Big Sandy Station, and left stere about 2 o'clock in the evening and trav eled 20 miles, wind blowing from the cast. The storm increased so as to prevent them from seeing five feet ahead; and compelled them again to lay up. Here the whole com-pany almost froze. Mr. G. states that his feet and legs were se numb as to be almost unable to stand up. The mail men having no bedding were compelled to walk around all night to keep from freezing. Fifth day -left early in the morning-traveled eight miles-one of the mail men's face and hands fore, and the other was so far froze as to be smost aslerp. Mr. G. here finding that the men would freeze, took them off and made them walk. They then turned and went back 28 miles to Big Sandy. The next day the wind ceased, and they started in company sith Mr. Ashton, the mail agent. They reached the South Pass at dark.

Here the wind raise I again; the snow being from five to ten feet deep, and they again became leat; for three or four hours they wandered round in hopes to find the road & their only hope was to face the wind in order to nach the Sweet Water, which they did .-They then attempted to travel down this stram but the drifted snow was so deep as w be impassible. They camped, and Mr. Ashton froze one of his feet while in bed. In the morning they left mules, mail and

Il and took it afoot down Sweet Water on theire. Mr Ashton begged to be left in his bel, as they had to cut the boots off of his fet. Mr. G. pulled off his buffalo moccasins and put them on Mr. Ashton-leaving his feet with only a deer-skin moccasin on. The shele company concluded their time was growing short; but, like heroes, made an efbrt-part of the time carrying Mr. Ashton. They reached a station about ten miles disnut. They then Lad some hopes of making the trip, although the thermometer stood 27 degrees below z.co.
