AGRICULTURAL.

Breeding Horses.

As there are many enormous opinions entertained respecting the breeding of horses, I trust I may be indulged a hearing if I give the public the observations I have on this subject As a practicle farmer, I do not hesitate to express my opinion, and give the PHILIP REYMER. prominent reason why we have so many horses of inferior size, strength, beauty and motion. This is not owing to the want of care taken of the colts, or to their not being well fed and sheltered during the severity of the winter. The fact is, that most farmers are induced to take good care of their animals, because it is for their interests to do so The great reason is, the mares selected for breeders are unfit for the purpose. They are, perhaps, two small, they lack physical vigor, or they have become old, or have been overworked or broken down. In addition to these defects they are not, sprightly or agile in their motions, nor kind in their disposition. Such animals should not be selected for breeding. Nor again should the sires be ill-shaped, overgrown, coarse, ungainly in their motions and malicions in their dispositions.

Observation shows that colts usually take the shape of the head, cars, chest, limbs and feet more from the sire than from the dam; while the size of the body, form of the hips, and color seem to bear a closer rescublance to the latter. For this reason the mare should be of good size, well proportioned and easy of motion, and it is unceessary to remark that all these qualities in a high degree, are phia. requisite in the sire. Some farmers greatly overvalue horses that are fast trotters, and marcs that move rapidly are held in market at a high price.

But they are by us means the most serviceable. You want herses that are of a good size, well proportioned, able bodied, kind and gentle, and capable of endurance in travel or work Such a race of horses you cannot have, if the sires and dams are defective in body and limb, and sluggish in their motions. What are called *fancy* horses, that for riding or driving are chosen by the dandies of our land, are of little worth. They lack physical strength, and are incapable of endurance. Their parentage is faulty-they are not descoudants of a noble race -- Rural American



Starting Seeds Early.

The Rev. Daniel Emerson, of Summit Co. Ohio, writes that he has been successful in giving garden seeds an early start in the following manner. Having selected the quantity needed, each sort is tied by itself in a cloth, the name being plainly written on a slip of paper, and inclosed with the seed .--The packages are then buried about two inches deep in the ground for a week or two When ready to plant, the kinds needed for planting are taken from the bags and used. They will be found to have swelled; perhaps. sprouted, and ready to grow If the ground should be quite dry, it is best to water the drills after dropping the seeds, and then cover with dry earth. 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
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
