

Four Days Later from Europe.

ARRIVAL OF THE CITY OF WASHINGTON.
The screw steamer City of Washington, Captain J. J. Petre, which sailed from Liverpool at 12.30 on the morning of the 21st of March, arrived at New York yesterday morning.

Lord Cowley presented his credentials on the 20th.
The Vienna correspondent of the Times states that the people was so disgusted at the policy of the Emperor Napoleon that they loudly expressed a hope for war, in order to end the present suspense.

Germany.—Thirty-nine members of the Warburg Chamber had issued a strong address, representing that the arrangements in France were made with a view of establishing vassal States for the Napoleon dynasty. This is the view entertained generally by the German radicals. Unless the Emperor abandons his war projects, it is asserted that the German sovereigns will have no choice but to form a coalition against him.

India and China.—The mails from Calcutta of January 22d, and Hong Kong January 15, reached England on the 28th ult.
The letters confirm the complete pacification of Oude. Lord Clyde arrived at Lucknow on the 17th of January.

Death of Mike Walsh.
Few men in this city were more notorious than Mike Walsh, whose body was found about half past 6 o'clock this morning, by Officer Courtney, at the foot of the steps leading to the basement of No. 123 North Second street. His neck was broken, and the body cold, and he is supposed to have died in a fit of temperance.

Decreased Immigration.—By Cause.—The table published in the Statistical Abstract of the United States during the past year, shows a marked decrease as compared with former years. According to the table, Germany and Ireland furnish together about fifty millions, and the principal sources from which have flowed the vast numbers of immigrants.

Jacobi and Evans.
These two wretched prisoners, who are to suffer the extreme penalty of the law on the 20th of May next, are beginning to suffer considerable mental agony. Evans spends a large portion of his time in Scripture reading and prayer, but as he persists in declaring his innocence, his heart is evidently not changed for the better.

An important Bill.

The following bill, to "prevent the intermarriage of the white and black races," has been offered in our State Legislature, and we trust may become a law.

Sec. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That from and after the passage of this act, it shall be unlawful for any black man to marry a white woman, or black woman to marry a white man.

Sec. 2. That any person or persons that shall marry in this Commonwealth, contrary to the first section of this act, and any justice of the peace, alderman, clergyman, minister or any other persons, who shall join in marriage any person contrary to this act, and every person who shall be present at such marriage, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions, having jurisdiction thereof, be fined at discretion of said court, in any sum not exceeding five dollars, which shall go one-half to such county as may have jurisdiction of such case, and shall be imprisoned in the county jail of such county any time not exceeding one year.

Sec. 3. A Constable pursued a thief who took refuge on a stump in a swamp, and pulled the rail after him on which he went in. The constable made the following remark: "Slightable—conversable—now est returned in swampum—up stumpum—railo."
