SEC. 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Penn sylvania in General Assembly met, and it is hereby exacted by the authority of the same. That from and after the passage of this act, it shall be unlawful for any black man to marry a white woman, or black woman to marry a white

Sec. 2. That any person or persons that shall marry in this Commonwealth, contrary to the first section of this act, and any justice of the peace, alderman, clergymen, minister or any other persons, who shall join in marriage any person contrary to this act, and every person who shall be present at such marriage, shall be deemed guilty of misdemeanor, and shall, upon conviction thereof in any court of quarter sessions, having jurisdiction thereof, be fined at discretion of said court, in any sum not exceeding five dollars, which shall go one-half to such county as may have jurisdiction of such case, and shall be imprisened in the county jail of such county any time not exceeding one year,
