If we adopt Professor Way's hypothesis in regard to the form in which wheat and other ceralia take up the silicia required to stiffen their straw-viz, as a double silicate of alumnia amonia-we have at once an explanation of the fact; for this double silicate is much more soluble in water containing salt than pure rain water.
