Potatoes-Improved Warleftes.

Wm. S. Carpenter of Harrison, Westchester County. a carefully experimenting cultivator, sends as the following observations upon several of the new or improved varieties of potatoes which he has grown. We think what 'he says will prove a valuable guide to others in selecting seed. He says:

"A description of twenty varieties from my sellection may not be unacceptable to some of your readers.

"Prince Albert-A seedling imported from England. They are an oblong shape. entirely white, with few eyes, which lie upon the surface, being one of the most beautiful potatoes over grown. Of this variety, I planted one acre on sward ground-yield 256 bushels to the acre. Washington-Originated in Massachusetts This is one of the finest table potatoes that have ever grown, it has a light red skin, and is white meated, cooking very dry, and fine flavored, it is of the medium size, round with deep set eyes; when boiled it has a dry flourlike appearance, and great delicacy of flavor, good yielder, and nearly free from rot.

Victoria-This is a new variety from Engfand, a large, slightly, oblong potato, per feetly white and smooth, cooking dry and mealy, it has been grown but one season in this country, and cannot be properly judged until a further trial it seems to possess a great many qualities for a market potatolarge yielder, and free from rot.

We saw an exhibition of Mr. Carpenters potatoes that he made last Fall at the Crystal Palace, which we should think would have tempted any farmer to try to emulate him. He is also originating seedlings, and constantly endeavoring to improve this indespersible article of food for all classes of the

American people. He thinks from the 1st to the 20th of May early enough to plant for a crop in this vicinity, and he would only use seed of his own growing two years in succession. He invariably cuts seed to two or three eyes to each hill. He has experienced much with manures, and modes of planting, and adopted the following :

Plant rank growing ones in drills 21 to 3 feet apart, and 18 to 20 inches between pieces. Never use manure. As soon as the rows can be seen, plow and hoe; and apply ashes and plaster, mixed in equal quantity, a bandful to each hill. Keep the ground well tilled till the plants blossom, and afterwards go over occasionally and pull one all weeds Ha
