The London Omnibus Company have recently made a report on the feeding of horses which discloses some interesting facts. It seems that the Company use no less than 6000 horses; three thousand of this number have for their feed bruised oats and cut bay and straw, and the other three thousand get whole oats and hay The allowance according to the first system was-bruised outs, sixteen pounds; cut hay, seven and a half pounds cut straw, two and a half pounds. The allowance according to the second-unbruised oats, nineteen pounds; uncut hay, thirteen pounds The bruised oats, cut hay and out straw amounted to twenty-six pounds, and the unbruised oats, &c., to thirty-two pounds. The horse which had bruised outs with cut hay and straw, consumed twenty-six pounds per day, and it appears it could do the work se well and was kept in as good condition as the horse which received thirty-two pounds mer day. Here was a saving of six pounds per day on the feeding of each horse receiving bruised oats, cut hay and straw. The advantage of braised oats and cut hay over unbruised oats and uncut hay is estimated at five cents a day on each horse, amounting to COACH MANUFACTORY \$300 per day for the Company's 6,000 horses It is by no means an unimportant result with which this experiment has supplied us. To the farmer who expends a large old stand to the shop lately occupied by John eum in the support of horse power, there are two points this experiment clearly establishes which in practice must be profitable; first, the saving of food to the amount of six pounds a day; and secondly, no loss of horse power arrising from that saving.

Squash and pumpkin seeds, laying flat in the hills when planted, do better than those planted edgewise, throwing off the skin of the seed more readily, and without injuring

Turnips among Corn.

I think some of our correspondents have already touched this subject; but no matter if they have the more that is said upon the sub ject the better. It's frequently the case that in pessing through cornfields in autum, we find the spaces between the rows occupied with sturdy weeds; sometimes this spurious vegitation overtops the maize, and "casts it into shade." Now, I would inquire, is it not much better and more prudent, in every sense of the word, for the farmer to occupy the soil monopolised by the exhausting weeds with some crop that will contribute to his resources, than to have it filled with such a crop. By sowing the Purple Top Turnip at the last dressing of the corn crop and 'scuffling' it in, or sowing just before a rain and allowing that to cover it, he can have a hundred bushels of good turnips per acre, if the soil be rich and well cultivated, instead of a host of worthless and pestilent weeds .-Germantown Telugraph

Yellow Locust Trees.

The timber of the Yellow Locust, unlike that of most rapid-growing trees, is very tough and durable. It has been known to remain sound, exposed to the weather in a fence, for thirty years. An old Illinois farmer, with whom they grew four feet per year writing to the Northwestern Christain Advocate, gives his method of planting and culture, from which we condense the following : water, and let it stand until partly cool; then thicken it with fine corn meal, and let it stand in a moderately warm place until the seed is mostly swelled. Plant in a nicelyfitted seed bed about the middle of May, and keep the bed well boed. Transplant the following spring, setting about eight feet apart and cultivate in hoed crops, for about two years, after which it may be stocked to any grass but red clover. Keep the forks trimmed off for the few first years, and the Machines. work is done."
