DEPARTMENT OF STATE. Washington, June 25, 1852.

The respect paid to any passport granted by this Department to a naturalized citizen, formerly a subject of Spain, will depend upon the laws of that country in relation to the allogiance due its authority by its native-born subjects. If that Government recognizes the tight of its subjects to denationalize themsolves, and assimilate with the citizens of other countries, the usual passport will be a sufficient safeguard to you; but if allegiance to the Crown of Spain may not legally be renounced by its subjects, you must expect to be liable to the obligation of a Spanish subject if you voluntarily place yourself within the jurisdiction of that Government.


