Ploughing by Steam.

Illineis appears to be taking the lead of other states in agricultural progressiveness. This subject is by no means a new one, although but little attention has been given to it until within two or three years past .-We will endeavor to present some information, showing what has already been done by others; so that the ground may be better understood than it now is.

for steam ploughing, efforts having been made twenty-seven years ago to re claim and cultivate Chat Moss by steam machinery.— An engine stationed at one end of a plot of land, was employed to drag plows through the soil by means of ropes passing over the dresm of a windlass. With some modifications of machienery, this system appears to be the most successful that has yet been attempted. The person who has done most to render ploughing by steam, in England, as economical in cultivating land as animal power, is Mr. John Fowler, an anricultural engineer, who has expended no less than \$100,000 for this soil, and they appear well steam plow that has yet been brought before the public embraces the locomotive principle of the engine moving over the entire field, drazging a set of ploughs, which is quite different in its nature from Fowler's, the one which has been most successful in Europe .-The engine used for operating a steam plough should also be capable of being applied to threshing, grinding and other operations of a farm, as none of our farmers can well afford to keep an engine for ploughing exclusively. In hilly countries the steam plough will never be able to supplant horses; but in such a state as Illinois, where the farms are very large, the soil mellow, and the fields nearly level, and where fuel is abundant, the steam plough appears to be invited to success .-Scientific American,

Transplanting, Easy, Safe and Pre-

We wish to impress upon the readers of the Agriculturist that it is a very simple and safe operation to transplant everything that Take an example. Here is a corn field plant- and receive a liberal share of public patronage. ed in rows and hills three by four feet, which allows 3,930 hills to the acre. Estimating the yield on a good soil, with all the hills perfect, at 56 bushels per acre, we have sbout a pint of corn to the bill But suppose we have 62 hills (one in every 90) deficient, there will then be a loss of one bushel of corn, with no less labor in preparing the ground and in the after cultivation, for the weeds should be heed down on the vacant spots. The vacant hills usually amount to one in 15 or 20, taking the whole field together. But with a trowel, or other simple impliment, a man will readily fill up sixty hills in an hour, or two at most, by transplanting from those that have an excess of plants. This could be done on a rainy day, and we doubt whether labor could be more profitably expended on the farm, in at least one half of the country, than in securing an extra bushel of corn by two hours' labor .-When the ground is wet it is easy to take a trowel or piece of shingle and divide a hill having superfluous shoots, lift out one side of the earth with the plants, and set them down where needed to fill in. Preserving Sweet Potatoes.
