# AGRICULTURAL.

The Dairy.

As an article of profit for the farmer, the dairy is equalled by few, excelled by none. It is far in advance of grain-raising; as it is much more certain and not exhaustive of the soil. Still it requires strict attention and close management. The surest way for a new beginner to obtain a good stock of cows, is to go to a large dairyman, and by prying a good round price, have the privilege of selecting the required number. In this way he will obtain the best stock, whereas if he buys them one at a place he will be very apt to get a poor animal, as it is buman nature to sell the poorest. If he has not means to adopt this method, the next best way is to engage of an honorable man the required number of heiffer calves. To have a good pasture is essential. A mixture of timothy and clover is the best grass. The stock should have plenty of clear, running water, not swamp settlings. A few shade trees in the lot will conduce very much to comfort in hot days. Have a trough under cover filled with salt, and give your cows free access to it; it improves the butter and cheese much more than a casual observer would imagine. Many farmers are in the habit of scattering salt on the ground about once a week, half of which is wasted, and the rest eaten with dirt and roots. As to the details of cheese-making it would be useless to give them. It requires practical illustrations and practice. It is considered more profitable than butter-making, especially in warm weath er. When butter is made, an ice house well filled is almost indispensable. A small piece should be placed in each vessel of milk, and a larger quantity in the cream when churning. The best churn that I have used is the common barrel churn; it is simply a barrel of oak with three of the staves projecting in the inside about four inches. It is placed on friction rollers requiring very little labor to turn it. There is no waste of cream, and the butter can be washed without removing it. I generally wash the butter in three waters, salt, and set it away until the next day, then work it again and pack in tubs. Cream rises the best when the milk is set above ground. A cool, dry room, on the north side of a building, with shade trees, if possible, is much suplenty of air, and the utensils should be kept clean and sweet .- Dollar Newspaper.

Seeding torn Land to Grass.

One of the real progressive farmers of Illinois-'one who does not fear such truths as Solon Robinson told the farmers in his address at Hartford"-writes of his success with a piece of surface-drained swamp land, which was too wet to plow in the spring, in seeding it with grass among the corn in the fall. He says: Last year, while thinking the matter over, and wondering whether it would not do to sow grass seed among the corn, an article appeared in the Daily Tribane recommending it. This decided the matter, and the men were set to work about the middle of August, or a little before, with garden rakes to smooth the rough places, and prepare the ground for seed. We then sowed liberally with timothy. When the proper time came we cut the corn up at the surface, as usual. In the spring we rolled the ground while rather soft, and have seldom had fields left in smoother and better condition for the mowing machine. The seed took remarkably well, and produced this year a fine crop of excellent hay. That editorial was worth the cost of the Daily Tribune for five years. Thinking that others might possibly profit by this experiment, I venture to give it to your readers.

### Pears-The Bartlett.

A correspondent, residing in a neighboring town, and having a very small lot asks us what single pear shall be plant to occupy the room which he has to spare? We answer without hesitation, the Bartlett. For general cultivation, it is in our judgment, incomparably the best, and second only to the Seckel, in quality. It is both an early and a constant bearer and where the tree is taken the least care of, the fruit is of the most uniform size of any pear within our knowledge. On a small dwarf tree, this season, we raised thirty two pears, all of large, uniform size-all perfeet-and all remained on the tree until the period of picking. So with several standard grafts, they were all loaded with fruit, with scarcely a small or imperfect pear and they all matured.

If any one was to ask us what six pears to cultivate, the answer would promptly be: 1. Bloodgood; 2. Seekel; 3 Bartlett; 4. Bell Lucrative; 5. Buerre Diel; 6. Lawrence.

# Fall Ploughing.

Fall plowing is not advantageous when the soil is thin and exposed to washing by ordinary rains or when heaved or loosened by frost; not if the ground is wet and springy, put a crop of rye on this fall. Under almost all other circumstances we believe fall plowing may be advantageous; certainly it is advisable on clay lands, or on heavy clay or gravelly loam, unless the land is apt to suffer from drought, and you wish to turn under a fresh sward in May or June, as a sort of reservoir plant upon it.

PEACH CREAM .- Get fine, soft, quite ripe peaches, peel them, take out the stones and then place them in a bowl-sprinkle some sugar on, and chop them small with a silver spoon; if the peaches are ripe they will become a soft pulp, add as much milk or cream as you have of the first; then add more sugar and freeze it.
