Stuchal was put on trial there for assault and battery upon his son, a child of some eight years. The evidence was very voluminous, and revealed a system of brutal treatment on the part of the father, of which the child was the victim, the details of which go beyond anything of the kind we have ever read. It was shown that he hung the child, on one occasion, to a joist by a rope fastened to its, thumbs, and that while in this position he compelled a younger brother to kindle a fire beneath him, so that he was almost roasted to death before he was taken dewn.

On another occasion he laid him on heated store, and subsequently compelled him to stockings to protect his feet from the heated metal.
