### ZGRIEUTEURZY.

EARTH OR ANGLE-WORMS.

The common earth or angle-worm infests old gardens and rich soils generally, much to the detriment of the appearance of the former where next walks and alleys are always desirable. They usually come to the surface in rains and after heavy dews, (hence taking the name of dew worm,) bringing with them a portion of the soil, and leaving their casts and trails wherever they move. These facts are generaly noticed, but few have studied their uses or sought to know the part they perform in the econemy of nature. Instead of being, as is generally supposed detrimental to the farmer, they are laborers with him in the improvement of the soil. A scientific writer on Zoology says:

"The burrowing of earth-worms is a process exceedingly useful to the gardner and agriculturists; and these animals are far more useful to man in this way, than they are injurious by destroying vegetables. They give s kind of under tillage to the land, performing the same below the ground that the spade does above for the garden and the for arable, land loosening the earth so as to render it permeable to air and water. It has lately been shown that they will even add to the depth of soil; covering barren tracts with a layer of productive mould. Thus in fields that have been overspread with lime burnt marl, or cinders, these substances are in time covered with finely-divided soil, well adapted to the support of vegetation

"That this result-which is not commonly attributed by farmers to the 'working down' of the material in question-is really due to the action of the earth worm, it appears from the fact that in the soil thus formed, large number of 'worm casts' may be distinguished. These are produced by the digestive process of the worms, which take into their intestinal canal, a large quantity of the soil through which they burrow, extract from it a great part of the decaying vegetable matter it may contain, and eject the rest in a finely divided state. In this manner a field manured with marl has become covered; in the course of eighty years, with a bed of earth averaging thirteen inches in thickness."

Another author speaks of the angle-worm (lumbricus terrestris) as the natural manure of the soil, and the ready indicator of its improved state. It consumes on the surface of the ground, where they would soon be injurious, the softer parts of decayed vegetable matters, and conveys into the soil the more woody fibres, where they moulder and become reduced to a simple nutriment, fitting for living vegetation. The parts consumed by them are soon returned to the surface, whence dissolved b; frosts and scattered by rains, they circulate again in the plants of of the soil -a ceaseless rotation, "death still producing life."

These worms are tender creatures and water remaining a few days over their haunts drowns them; they easily become frozen, unless they enter deeper into the ground to escape the cold No sooner is the frost out of the ground, than they come to the surface and go to work again. We have observed that a certain degree of moisture seems necessary to their activity; they go down to the depth of eighteen inches or two feet in extreme dry weather. We have found them knotted in a compact ball in a dry hard subsoil, so hard as to require a pick to penetrate it. Various other characteristics in their nat ural history might be mentioned, but they do not refer particularly to their agricultural uses, we leave them to the researches of the curious reader .- Country Gentleman
