Interesting Pacts for Farmers. We take from a long article by a correspondent in the New England Furmer, the following extract, which we are sure will be perused with interest, by our agricultural readers:

Every practical, observing tiller of the soil well understands that no guano, super-phosphate or other nitrogenous or highly concentrated manures, can restore to the soil the lost carbon, which has supplied a succession of crops, which are essential materials which enter into the fourteen elements of grain, fruits and grass. The true principle of agricultural science introduces another system, natural, plain and altogether dissimilar. The forest must give up her store of carbon, and she manufactures a large surplus annually, so nicely elaborated by nature's laws as to fix its ammonia, and yet fitted for a powerful absorbant of liquid manures, with power to resist decomposition until brought in contact with the roots of plants. The swamps must yield up their store of vegetable wealth, the rich inorganic materials of surrounding hills and forests, to reunite with the minerel salts too firmly fixed in the soil to be washed away by the annual rains. The organic laws of the Universe established by the Creator, for he government of all changes and formal conditions of properties of matter whether in a crude mineral organized or detached condition, are as uniform and unerring as the physical laws that govern the rising and setting of the sun. As the demand for carbon to form fat muscle, cellar tissue bone braid. hair and other portions of the human body, and at the same time keep up an animal heat of 98 degrees night and day, is very great we readily see why starch is so abundant in all plants used as food for man and beast .-Starch contains a large amount of carbon, and the swamps of the old States are holding the great bulk of earbon to day. We must increase the productiveness of rural labor by introducing into the present mode of farming more system in the science of vegetable physiology.

Every one knows that new land, never sub lected the cultivation, will produce in abundance, all the crop which that country or dis trict is susceptible of producing. Hence we are advised that the forests and swamps of any hilly region hold its vegetable wealth. Science now comes to our aid, and teaches us how to change a cold subsoil into a warm, pliable, productive, surface soil. Practical experience has taught us that a good soil which produces 100 pounds of ripe wheat plants, loses but 16 pounds of its weight and substance by the operation, 85 pounds coming from the atmosphere. Science reveals to us why it is that in combustion, respiration and decomposition, and immense amount of organized matter is dissipated through the air-infused into the plants by atmospheric pressure, or gathered up by the falling dews, rains and snows returned to the earth and the roots of plants, and thence by capilliary attraction, drawn into the kernel, and elaborated as food for man and beast.

Top-Dressing Grass and Grain Crops in Spring.

We would remind our southern readers, in latitudes where the spring commences this month or next, that the top-dressing of grain crops is highly important. Where the soils are evidently short of potash, top-dress with wood ashes; where there are generally deficient in the production of crops, top dress with one bag of Nitrogenized Super-phosphate of Lime per acre, previously mixing it with three or four times its bulk of soil to secure its evan devision. Such practice will pay a good profit; it should be applied before the spring rains, so that it will be evenly divided through the soil and brought in contact with the spongioles on their early starting .--We have known grain crops to be materially increased by such practice. Further North the grass crops should be top-dressed in the same manner. We have frequently known an increase of a ton of hay to the acre by this practice. And where the intention is to plow up old sods, such top-dressing secures so a division of the manure used, as to render it peculiarily available for the use of the intended crops. When potatoes or corn are to be grown on the old sod, a still larger amount phosphate may be used with advantage. In thus early top-dressing, it not only furnishes pabulum for the intended crop, but material ly assists in the decomposition of the sod, readering the decomposed organic matter fit pabulum for immediate assimulation .- Working Farmer.

Ssrawberries, We know of no more important fruit than the strawberry; there is certainly none to which more attention has been given. Many persons have not had arrangements made for planting in the fall, and have therefore deferred till Spring. They must be promptly at work as soon as the weather will permit, for there is little time to spare.
