Marietta, following the course of the river .-The damages done is estimated at \$1,000 .-000. All the towns and villages on the river above Cincinnati have suffered severely .-Thirty-six pairs of coal boats, with 900,000 bushels of coal, are known to have sunk, and it is feared that nearly 100 lives are lost.
