A Word for Weeds.

Our neighbor has just made an argument for weeds which should not go unpublished "I let them grow in my garden," he says, "to keep off the hot sun and the bugs from my encumbers. I would not, indeed, let enough grow to exactly smother the vines but enough to keep off the insects, and to shade the ground and keep it cool." As he said this, the muscles of his face seemed a little disturbed, as though he half distrusted his own theory, but he kept his countenance quite

What a dunce! Even if the leaves shade the ground, what do the roots do meanwhile? Pump it of its moisture and send the vapor off into mid air, rendering the soil dryer than it would have been if exposed to the full rays of the sun. Let any one try the experiment and he will be satisfied. And then, as to pro tecting the vines from bugs, we very much question it. No, no The only rational way to garden successfully, is to keep down the weeds. If the ground is suffering from the drouth, run the cultivator through it, keep the hoes bright, and this will keep the soil in the best possible condition for absorbing the nightly dews Caltivate the cucumbers well surround them with boxes, and they will soon run away from the insects. - American Agri-

Barrels for Fruit.

Everything in contact with fruit should be clean and sweet, and the vessel in which it is placed should be dry and tight. Old flour barrels should not be used, unless well washed and dried, as the particles of flour left in the barrel will mould and impart to the fruit an unpleasant odor and flavor. Old hme bar rels, it is said, are excellent for this purpose -the lime absorbing the vapor and gases .-If this is so, a little fresh slaked lime scattered on the bottom, sides and top of the barrel, would be beneficial

Kidney-Worms in Swine.

The Germantown Telegraph says that this disease may generally be known by the animal appearing weak across the loins, and sometimes by a weakness in one or both hind legs. As soon as these symptoms appear, give the animal corn that is soaked in lye of It Tells You The symptoms of Croup, Cholera wood ashes or strong soap-suds, and at the same time rub the loins with turpentine. An Ohio farmer cures this disease by giving one ounce of copperas daily, for six or eight days dissolved in warm water, and mixed with two quarts of corn meal and dish-water.

The Eyes of Horses and Cattle.

In the New England Farmer, a correspondent gives the following remedy, when horses or cattle injure their eyes so as to bring on a white substance or film. He says;

"Take fresh butter, newly churned; melt about a tablespoonful, and turn it into the ear opposite the eye injured, being careful to hold the ear tight together, so that they shall not by a violent shake of the head, throw it out of the ear." This remedy, he says, may be safely applied, if you do not use them when the film is coming off.

Heaves in Horses.

A correspondent asks for a cure for heaves in horses. I will send you one that a friend of mine gave me some time ago, which he says he has tried to his satisfaction, and thinks it a certain cure, and I believe him to be a man it in the Farmer:

One pound of antimony, half a pound of sulphur, half a pound nitre, one-fourth pound rosin; powder fine and mix together. Give a balf a tablespoonful twice a week, mixed with his food. I cannot vouch for the above not having tried it .- Henry Cox, Wheatland

To Kill Vermin on Cattle or Fowls.

A writer in the New England Farmer says: "Take common lamp oil and rub it well back of the ears and all down the back. Do this once a week, and the vermin will disappear. It is safe. Tobacco will kill lice, but should be used cautiously. Rub lamp oil on the back of the head, under the wings, and over the posteriors of any fowl once a month, and it will clear out all lice."

Tight Barns for Hay.

No practical and observing farmer will say that his hay is kept better or sweeter in a tight barn, than in one which admits some air between the boards.

Hay will prove musty in very tight baros unless it has been so much dried as to injure it. In common barns hay that has had two day's drying will keep well though put in a large mow, provided that the air may come nificient Engraving of Christopher Columbus, in at the sides.
