No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, furnished by the Commissioner, unless first he produce a receipt for the payment within two years of a State or County tax, assessed agreeably to the Constitution and give satisfactory evidence, either on his own oath or affirmation, or that of another, that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make oath of the payment thereof, or, second, if he claim a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years, he shall depose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application, and make such proof of his residence in the district as is required by this Act and that he does verily believe, from the accounts given him, that he is of age aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person so admitted to vote, shall be inserted in the Alphabetical list by the Inspectors, and a note made opposite thereto by writing the word "Tax" if he shall be permitted to vote by reason of having paid tax; or the word "Age" if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of such age shall be called out to the Clerks, who shall make like notes in the list of voters
