No person shall be permitted to vote at any election, as aforesaid, but a white freeman of the age of twenty one years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and within two years next preceding the date of such election shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election. But a citizen of the United States, who had previously been a qualified voter of this State, and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district, and paid taxes as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months. Provided, That the white freeman, citizens of the United States, between the ages of twenty one and twenty-two years, and have resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid taxes.  
No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not contained in the list of taxable inhabitants, furnished by the Commissioner, unless first he produce a receipt for the payment within two years of a State or County tax, assessed agreeably to the Constitution and give satisfactory evidence, either on his own oath or affirmation, or that of another person, that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make oath of the payment thereof, or second, if he claim a right to vote by being an elector between the age of twenty-one and twenty-two years, he shall depose on oath or affirmation that he has resided in the State at least one year before his application, and make such proof of his residence in the district as is required by this act, and that he does verily believe, from the accounts given him, that he is of age aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person so admitted to vote, shall be inserted in the Alphabetical list by the Inspectors, and a note made up opposite thereto by writing the word "Age" if he shall be permitted to vote by reason of having paid tax; or the word "Age" if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of such age shall be called out to the Clerks, who shall make like notes in the list of voters kept by them.  
In all cases where the name of a person claiming to vote as found on the list furnished by the Commissioners and Assessor, or his right to vote, whether found thereon or not is objected to by any qualified citizen, it shall be the duty of the Inspectors to examine such person on oath as to his qualifications, and if he claims to have resided within the State for one year or more, his oath shall not be sufficient proof thereof, but shall make proof thereof by at least one competent witness, who shall be a qualified elector, that he has resided within the district for more than ten days next preceding said election, and shall also himself swear that his bona fide residence, in pursuance of his lawful calling, is within the district, and that he did not remove into said district for the purpose of voting therein.  
Every person qualified, as aforesaid, and who shall make due proof, is required of his residence, and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward, or district, in which he shall reside.  
If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent, any officer of any election under this act from holding such election, or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, or shall interrupt or improperly interfere within the execution of his duty, or shall block up in the window, or avenue to any window, where the same is being held, or shall riotously disturb the peace of such election, or shall use or practice any intimidating threats, force or violence, with design to influence unduly, or overawe, any elector, or prevent him from voting, or to restrain the freedom of choice, such person convicted shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$500, to be imprisoned for any time not less than one month, nor more than 12 months; and if it shall be shown to the Court where the trial of such offence shall be had, that the person so offending was not a resident of the ward, or district or township where the said offence was committed, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine not less than one hundred, nor more than one thousand dollars, and imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two years.  
Pursuant to the provisions contained in the Act first aforesaid, the Judges of election in each district shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one Judge from each district, at the Court House, in the Borough of Ebensburg, on the third day after the day of election, to-wit, Friday the 12th day of October, A. D., 1860, when and where they shall perform those duties required of them by law.  
And further, if any Judge, by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or clerks of the election of the same district, who shall do and perform the duties of said Judge unable to attend.
