A Remedy for the Wheat Midge. A correspondent of the Canadian Agriculturist, makes the following statement, which will be read with great satisfaction in all the wheat growing regions in this country. I am rejoice I that this week I can an-

nounce the arrival of a deadly enemy to the wheat midge or fly. In the neighborhood of Sparts township of Yardmouth, the farmers have discovered some species of ichneumons which deposit their eggs in the larva. One of these is very small, black and shinning; the other is also black, with red feet and blant tail These are often mistaken for the they have four, the distinction is obvious .-To observe the proceedings of the ichneumons, place a number of the maggets or larvad of the wheat fly on a sheet of paper, and set a female ichneumon in the midst of them; she soon pounces upon her victim, and intensely vibrating her atennae, bending herself obliquely plunges her oviopositor into the body of the larva, depositing in it a single egg. She will then pass to the second and so on, depositing a single egg in each. It should be remembered, then, that apples for preservation should never be shaken off the tree, but should be picked very carefully, and laid, not thrown, into baskets. The slightest bruise will lead to early decay. For the same reason, the apples, after being gath ered, should not be poured from the brakets into barrals or bags, or even upon the floor They should be moved from one receptacle to another with such carefulness that no possible bruise or sear can happen to them; and very valuable or tender fruit should be moved one by one, by the hand. Those that are wormesten or defective, should not be thrown down and left on the ground-as they will thus be likely to add to the numbers of the insect devastators of future years-but taken up and fed to the hogs, either raw or boiled .- Ex.

Ralbits from Trees -Do not use gas tar to preserve young trees from rabbits, but take strips of old cotton, or any other cloth, two inches wide, wind spirally from the ground up, out of the reach of rabbits, which will thorougly protect them through the winter.
