Shall We Plow in the Fall.

All lands, except light loams and sandy soils, are benefitted by fall plowing unless It Tells You How to draw up partnership papers they are exposed to washing. Steep side hills should never be plowed in the fall, unless you sow them immediately with grain or grass seed, to furnish roots for holding the the soil in place

But all heavy loams lying flat, and clays are greatly benefitted by fall plowing. The teams are generally in the best condition for plowing at this season. They have had good pasturage through the summer, and, as a rule, have less to do in the winter and Spring. It puts the spring work very much ahead have all the green sward turned over in the Fall. However much of this may be done. the teams will have enough to do in the Spring, in carting manure, cross-plowing, harrowing, and getting ready for sowing and planting.

In the Fall, the lands that are most benefitted by plowing, are generally in the best condition for the operation. In the spring they are often so wet that they cannot be plowed until May or June. Now they are dry, and will crumble as they are turned

By plowing now, they are prepared to recieve the full benefit of the action of the frost rain and snow through the Winter There are no disintegrators like the elements. Stiff clays and hard pans are made loose and friable by these exposures. The more rough and broken they are left by the plow, the better. Then, there are rough pasture swards full of brush and rank weeds, and reclained swamps with a thick turf of swamp grasses, that are best subdued by tearing them up now. They freeze and thaw through the Winter, and a little life is left in them by Spring.

Besides this, plowing has an important influence upon insect life. Many insects burrow in the earth, and if left undisturbed. come forth with new life in the Spring. Plowing disturbs their winter arrangements and kills millions of their larve At this season the soil may be safely plowed deeper than in the Spring. The inch or two of yellow soft will undergo important changes before Spring .- American Agriculturist,



Corn Stalks.

The practice of placing corn stalks uncut before cattle still prevails in many parts of the country. The blades are eaten off, the tender part of the top, perhaps, consumed, and the rest left on the ground to decay. We have long since advocated the cutting and steaming of corn stalks, and their admixture with slight quantities of ground feed, to induce the cattle to consume them With such treatment we succeed in having them cleanly eaten up, but when the stocks are cut and not steamed, even when supplied with a slight quantity of moistened feed, great waste occurs. The larger pieces are left by the animals. More recently we have experimented in cutting these stalks much fiver. We think that those who have horse powers for running their cutting boxes, will find it to their advantage to pass the cornstalks before cuting, through a pair of plain rollers, so as to completely crush their silecious clothing. The outside of the corn stalk looses its aroma, and becomes distasteful to cattle, while its hard coating renders it difficult for them to properly masticate it. A plain pair of iron rollers, of four inches in diameter, and six inches long, and set with a spring of sufficient force to secure the crushing of the cornstalk, would crush more than a ton an hour, with great ease; and we cannot but believe, that after such treatment, these stalks passed through a cutting box or chafing machine, would furnish a fodder very acceptable to cattle, for it would then be soft, and free to cattle, for it would then be soft, and free from the objections urged against corn stalks MAGNIFCIENT ENGRAVING OF CHRISTOPHER COLUMBUS AND in their natural state.
