

AGRICULTURE.

Save the Leaves.
If Brother Jonathan were as saving of manure as John Ball is, he would be a better farmer. No one knows until he has it, how careful English and European farmers and gardeners are of everything which can be converted into manure. And this is on the ground of their superiority in agriculture.

Now, let us repeat what we have often said that few things are more valuable for fertilizing purposes than leaves. They are hardly inferior to barn-yard manure. Gather them up now, this very month of November, before they are covered by the snow. They are abundant everywhere, lying in heaps and windrows in the forest and by the roadside, and by the fences in every yard. The wood lot should not be stripped clean of them; but double every farmer's land contains more of them here and there than he can find time to cart home. Gather them up by taking, or sweeping with a large birch broom. Stack them and pack them in the large wagon, adding side-boards as high as convenient; you will hardly get too heavy a load. Cart them home and use them as bedding for cattle and horses; use them for compost in the stable-yard; use them to protect tender grape vines and shrubs and plants in winter. Strawberry patches will fairly sing for joy under such a feathery blanket. By all means save the leaves, and use them.—*American Agriculturist.*

Catves with Sheep.

It is well known, perhaps, to most of our agricultural readers, that late calves, when they come to the barn in the fall, will, if confined in yards with older animals, frequently sicken and become debilitated—being weak and small, they are usually shovelled about, and deprived of their due share of food, and in consequence, "fall away" rapidly. Now I never allow animals of this description to associate or be confined with larger ones, but put them with my sheep, where there is no danger of their doing or receiving harm.—Sick calves often pick up and devour with avidity the hay and straw from among the sheep dung. It is medicinal, and I know of no article that has a more immediate and salutary effect in restoring diseased calves to health than sheep dung. I have practiced this usage for many years, and have never lost an animal, though I have had many sick when they came to the barn.—*A Chester county Farmer.—German town Telegraph.*

Small Farms need plenty of Manure.

H. P. Smead, in the *Chester Register*, talks right to the point, as follows:
"If a farmer has but forty or eighty acres to cultivate, and has a stock-yard or barn, to which he draws all his grain to thresh, and there lets his stock live through the winter, converting all his straw into manure, he can make manure enough to keep the forty or eighty acres in a good condition for growing good crops from generation to generation. Also, a small farm thus managed is much more profitable, in proportion to a large farm managed in the usual way. There are fewer acres to pay taxes upon; there is less money invested; there is less fueling to make and keep in repair; leaving the owner much less expense, and a greater profit, according to the capital invested and expended."

Ice Houses.—A correspondent of the *Country Gentleman* says that he had an ice house made two years ago, 16 feet in diameter, perfectly round, made of stone, plenty of sand at the bottom to take off all water. He filled it last winter with snow ice, just throw it in without placing it, and covered with straw, (put straw at the bottom on rails first,) more on the sides, and he had all the ice he wanted and plenty left yet.

To Drive Away Rats.—A correspondent of the *Gardener's Monthly* says:
"I tried the effect of introducing into the entrance of their numerous holes, runs or hiding places, small portions of chloride of lime or bleaching powder, wrapped in calico, and stuffed into the entrance holes, and thrown loosely by spoonfuls into the drain from the house. This drove the rats away for a twelve month, when they returned to it. They were treated in the same manner, with like effect. The cure was most complete. I presume it was the chlorine gas which did not agree with their olfactory."

Fruit Trees in the Vicinity of Barn yards.
—It will be well, says the *Saratoga Farmer*. If farmers would surround their barn yards and pig pens with fruit trees. Such trees abundantly, and heavy crops of plums can often be obtained in such places, as the stung fruit is sure to be picked up and devoured as soon as it falls, thus preventing the increase of the curculio. Apples, pears, cherries and all other fruit, do well for the same reason, and they are also provided with a plentiful amount of liquid manure from the drainage of the barn-yard.

Barrels for fruit.—Everything in contact with fruit should be clean and sweet, and the vessel in which it is placed should be dry and tight. Old flour barrels should not be used unless well washed and dried, as the particles of flour left in the barrel and mould, and impart to the fruit an unpleasant odor and flavor. Old lime barrels, it is said, are excellent for this purpose. If this is so, a little fresh slaked lime scattered on the bottom, sides, and top of the barrel, would be beneficial.

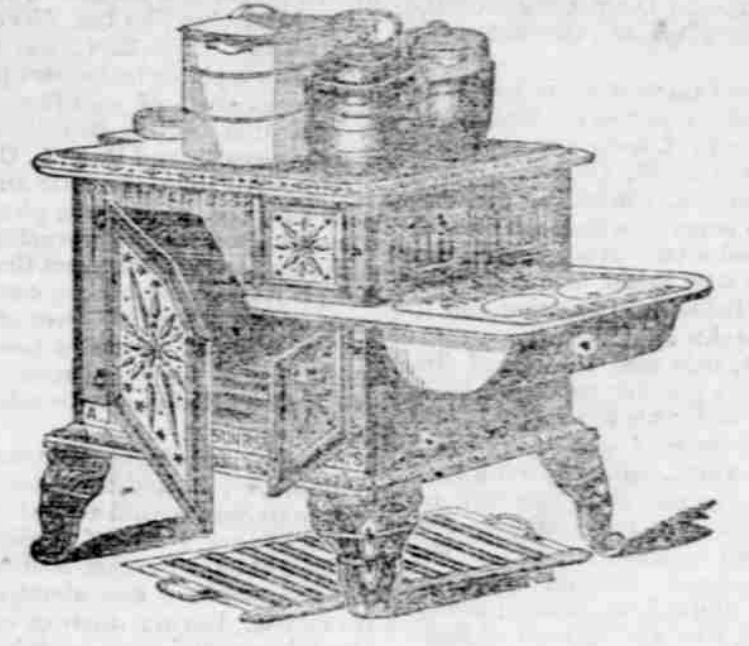
