Animal Food and Bread. A paper was recently read before the London Chemical Society by Dr Gilbert, on the composition of the animal portion of human food, and on its relations to bread. The gen eral conclusions were, that only a small portion of the increase of a fatening animal was composed of nitrogenous matter; that from five to ten per cent, only of the nitrogenous matter of the food was stored up in the body of the animal; but that the amount of fat stored up was frequently greater than the amount supplied in the food, despite the loss incurred in the maintenance of the respiratory functions. Hence, the comparative value of fatening foods was proportional rather to the amounts of respiratory than of assumed fleshforming constituents. It was calculated that in those portions of the carcasses of oxen actually consumed as human food, the amount of dry fat was from two to three times as great as the amount of dry nitrogenous matter; and in the eaten portions of the carcasses of sheep and pigs, more than four times as great. By substituting for the above proportions of fat, their respiratory equivalents in starch. so as to allow of a comparison between meat and bread, the ratios become six or seven to one and eleven to one respectively. From various determinations made by a number of experimenters, it appeared that in wheat bread the ratio of starchy to nitrogenous matter was six or seven to one; so that in bread the proportion of spimal flesh-forming constituents was greater than the eaten portions of sheep and pigs, and quite equal to that of the eaten

Coal for Hogs.

pertions of oxen-a conclusion altogether op-

posed to the prevalent notions on the subject.

The well known Mr. Mechi, of Tiptree Hall, has discovered that "pige are very fond of coal ashes or cinders," and that "they can hardly be fatened on boarded floors without giving them a moderate supply daily, or occasionly." In the absence of coal ashes, he would give "burned clay or brick-dust." He would "leave to science to explain the cause of this want" Probably many farmers have noticed that hogs which are kept in close pens and fed on very nutritious food; have an appetite for carbonsecous matter, particularly for charcoal. If they cannot get this, they will eat decayed wood, straw or hay, penty earth, stone coal or coal ashes. Even poultry of all kinds, while confined and fed with grain, will eat considerable charcoal, if put into such condition that they can swallow it Those who have observed the effect of charcoal on these animals, know that it promotes their health and thrift. Precisely how it does this, it is not so easy to explain, fully, though something may be safely assumed -Among the human race, charcoal is sometimes taken with good effect by dyspeptic people, especially for the correction of acids in the etomach. Is it not probable that this substance produces a similar effect on the lower animals? Another advantage may be the dis tension of the intestines, which are liable to become too contracted, and sluggish in their action, when the animal is fed wholly on concentrated food. But if farmers will give their hogs charcoal, which in most parts of the country can be readily obtained, they need not trouble themselves to get stone-coal cinders or brick dust for them.

Lime and Wheat.

George H. Chase, an enterprising young farmer of Union Spring, N. Y., bas tried an experiment the present season with salt, ashes and lime, on wheat. An acre each was selected for the three experiments. About two barrels of salt were applied to one, two twohorse loads of ashes to a second, and a hundred bushels of lime to the third acre The result has not been measured as yet, but the effects of each are visible The salt proved least useful; the ashes more so; and the lime most so of all. Preserving Homs .- Take slacked lime, say a peck or half bushel, (according to the number of hams,) mix the lime with water, and boil in an iron vessel, the same as you would for whitewashing; let it boil as thick as for whitewashing, and when cold, have your hams laid with the skin down upon planks; then take a brush, (the same as for whitewashing,) and lay a good coat upon the part from bugs and skippers, if done in time .-Rural American.


