His duty is to labor as his strength will admit, and when he has done his work for the day, he will be tired enough to ge to bed, without nodding over a book written by some idle person who is too lazy to work. Such has been the feelicg of the mass of cultivators of the soil, but is now happily changing. No man needs a good library more than the farmer. He has a profession that as really requires study to It Tells Fou The law concerning Pensions and master it as the lawyer's or teacher's. There is hardly a branch of natural science that will contribute greatly to his benefit. He also needs books upon horses, cattle, sheep; the management of the dairy; the care of the bees; the proper way to raise apples, pears, and other fruits; the treatment of different soils, &c. In addition to these, the farmer should bave books of literature, history and travels. He will be as much interested and benefited by their perusal as any one. The money spent in purchasing a reasonable number of books, and the time spent in their study will not be lost. Knowledge will give ability to increase the income of his farm, and will elevate his standing in the community A farmer's family also needs the means of improvement found in a well assorted library, and intellectual advancement, and to increase love of home. It may be thought by some that the expense be afforded, but if a few are purchased at a time, in a few years a library of a hundred or more valuable volume may be gathered, which will be worth more than the same number of dollars at interest -- Exchange.

FrozeniPlants.

If this Winter is like all that have preceded it in our day, many plants and vegetable will be frozen. Some still, clear night, Jack Frost will steal into the cellar, and turn the apples and potatoes into so many stones. He will also find his way into the lady's parlor or chamber, where she keeps her house-plants, and ah mel next morning, her sweet pais will be as rigid as the artificial flowers on her bonnet. The bundle of trees which I ordered so late, from-& Co's, nursery, will be detained on the way, and I shall receive them all frozen together, as bard as logs. Now, what shall be done in these several cases? Shall the potatoes and apples be drenched with warm water to take out the frost? No; cover them with old mats or carpets, and let them thaw out as gradually as possible. And the dear flowers? Don't hurry them into a warm room to thaw by the side of a stove, as you would a frost bitten chicken Let them remain where they are E Tells For The best and simplest treatment for frozen; close the window shutters or drop the curtains, so as to make the room quite dark, then sprinkle the plants with cold water direct from the cistern, and wait for the result It Tells You Of the various diseases of Women. Do not allow the room to become warmer than 350 for twenty four hours. If a few drops of spirits of campbor are thrown into the dish of water before sprinkling, it will be all the better. We treated a dozen plants in this way last winter, and the frost was so severe that the water froze in drops on the leaves as we sprinkled them, but by keeping the room dark and cool an entire day, nearly every plant came out unharmed. We remember, in particular, a fuchsia which was in full flower at the time of the freezing; a week after it was still covered with blooms. A neighboring gardner had the misfortune, also, to have a large lot of geraniums frozen. In his anxiety, he hurried a part into a warm green-house and a part into a cellar. The first were near ly all ruined, the latter were all saved-The package of frozed trees must be taken ever lived; the cost of the original design and to the garden, a trench dug large and deep enough to receive them root and branch, and then they should be covered with soil. 
