Italian Bees-Their Habits and Qualities.

The following extract from a letter written by Dr. J. P. Kirtland, of Cleveland, Ohio, to J. B. Parsons, of Flushing, fully confirms the views heretofore expressed in the Evening Post, of the substantial superiority of the Italian over any other bee for the harvesting It Tells You The laws for the collection of Debts,

"In your last letter you expressed a wish to hear from me the result of my experience with the Italian bees, &c.

"1st Their disposition to labor far excels that of the common kind. From the earliest dawn of day to the arrival of evening they are invariably passing in and out of the hive, and rarely suspend their work for winds, heat or moderate showers, at times when not a solitary individual of the common kind is to be seen. Two hours each day their labors are extended beyond the working time of the last nemed kind.

"24. Power of endurance, and especially of resisting the impression of cold they possess in a marked degree. Since the buckwheat, solidigoes and asters have flowered the nights have been remarkably cold in this vicinity. This low temperature has, in a great measure, suspended the efforts of the common bees and they have been eating their previously accumulated stores. Not so with the Italians; they have been steadily accumulating honey and bee bread, and rapidly multiplying their numbers. They seem to be peculilarly adapted to resist the chilly atmosphere and high winds which predominate in autumn on the shores of Lake Erie.

"3d. Prolificness they equally excel in .-Both my full and half blooded stock have become numerous and strong in number as well as in stores, at this late season of the year when the common kinds have ceased increasing, and have become nearly passive.

4th. Their individual strength is greater, and this is well illustrated in their prompt manner of tasting to a great distance, with a prompt manner, any robber that chances to approach their hive.

"5th. Their beauty of coloring and graceful form render them an object of interest to every person of taste. My colonies are daily watched and admired by many visitors.

"6th. Of their moral character I cannot speak favorably. If robbery of weakened col onies is going on these yellow-jackets are sure to be on hand.

"So far as my experience has gone with them. I find every statement regard to their superiority sustained. They will no doubt prove a valuable acquisition to localities of high altitude, and will be peculiarly adapted to the climate of Washington territory, Oregon, and the mountaneous regions of California. Dead Horses.

Inducing Fruit Bearing .- "An old subscriber" writes. "I have tried with most gratifying success a method of promoting fertility in trees, which was first suggested in the Agriculturist. I have a large Bartlett pear tree which has persisted year by year in 1 cash making a most rampart growth, but which refused to do its duty in the more important of fruit bearing. In July last year, I took a stout cord and bound it as tightly as possible three or four times around the trunk of the tree, and left it there until November. The result is that this year my tree had about three hundred large, fine looking pears on it. so loading it down that I had to prop up several of the branches to prevent their breaking The tree at the same time has made e strong, healthy growth of about six inches."

"Sweetening" cut hay for Cows .- A correspondent of the Homestead, in account of a noted milk farm near Hartford, says the farmer, Mr Gates, cuts most of his hay in winter, moistening it, and thoroughly mixing it with a thin swill of rye, corn and cotton seed meal, and water, allowing the mass to lie from one feeding time to another, to swell and sweaten before using. "I say sweeten, not turn sour-he feeds before it comes to that." The writer thinks the process analagous to that undergone in a sour apple, which "if bruised on the side, the juice of that spot becomes decidedly sweet in a short time-the sacharine ferment."
