## AGRICULTURAL.

### Premium Wheat in Ashtabuala County.

At the annual meeting of the Conneaught Agricultural Society, held in January a first premium of two dollars was awarded to D. W. Hazeltine, of Conneaut, for the best wheat, yielding 54 3 60 bushels of grain well cleaned and accurately measured, as per evidence of the file in the Secretary's office. The following is Mr. Hazeltines statement:

The question is often asked how I manage to get such crops. In reply to which I would say, manure well, and till well. My farm contains 55 acres, 14 acres in timber, leaving 41 acres of tilable land, on which I am keeping fourteen head of cattle, four horses, seventeen sheep and ten hogs. Have raised the past senson on this farm, three hundred and forty bushels of wheat, six hundred and forty bushels of corn, two hundred bushels of sound potatoes, bosides the rotten ones, and sufficient hay and other to winter my stock. The principle object is to make all the money for the pocket and manure for the land possible. For the last three years I have plowed under in June while in fall bloom, from two and a half to three acres of clover, and I would here say that if the people would only adopt a more liberal method of farming and get their land in a proper state of cultivation, and then put in their crops and take care of them there would soon be less skeptism in regard to the large crops.

I came to this farm in the spring of 1857, and there was then in ground two and a half acres of winter wheat, from which I harvested and threshed seven bushels of wheat all told, nice plump white wheat in the fall. I sowed the seven bushels on four acres, from which I harvested the following season one hundred and two bushels of nice wheat. The next piece sowed was the two and a half acres which I found sowed with wheat when I took possession of the farm, which I harvested in 1859, one hundred and five bushels of excellent wheat, and the past season the above statement from the Secretary shows what L produced on one acre, and would here say that the wheat crop of 1859 was injured by frost in June-the heads did not fill out at the tips-the object of this is to show that my land goes on steadily increasing in yield as its quality and tillage is improved. 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

#### Seed Corn--How to Produce Early Germination.

If you did not, as you have often been advised to do, save your seed corn by selecting the best ears in the field, do not lose an other day, but go to your corn cribs and pick out the handsomest ears that you can find, and store them up in some dry loft, no matter if it is a very smoky one, and as hot as a July sun, it won't hurt the vitality of the seed.

It is of the highest importance that your seed should germinate immediately after you plant it. That is of more importance than early planting. Germination can undoubtedly be hastened by artificial means. Dr. Chamberlain of Burea county Ill., has made some important discoveries in this direction. -The Republican says:

'Last year Dr. Chamberlam of this place, made some practical experiments, and demonstrted that nearly half the time may be savod in germinating the seed by the use of chloride of lime.

Not satisfied with the success of the last year, he is again experimenting. In his office he has four boxes; in the first is corn planted without soaking, and the seed not germinuted; in the second, the seed was soaked in warm water, which had just commenced to germinate, in the third it was soaked in a solution of lime, and green blades are just peeping from the ground; in the fourth is seed soaked in a solution of chloride of lime and now nearly three inches above ground All the seed were planted at the same time in the To be given to the purchasers. 
