FORTRESS MONROE, August 9.—A flag of truce is just in from Norfolk with Miss Gray, a niece of Gen. Scott, on her way from Richmond, to New York. She states that Gen. Mageruder has occupied New Market Bridge. He will shortly venture to attack Newport News. Mr. Mahow states that there have been some seven thousand rebels stationed at Yorktown. Some two days ago, a battalion came down to the out-skirts of Hampton and carried away one hundred and eighty negroes. Provisions are abundant at Yorktown, and most of the regiments are receiving new uniforms for a winter's campaign.

There is an impression abroad that the soldiers' pay has been increased four dollars per month. It is not so. Each House of Congress adopted a provision to increase the pay of soldiers, sailors and marines four dollars a month, but their action was not united on the same bill. The result, however was concurrent action on another bill at a later period, which has become a law, increasing the pay two dollars per month.—Philadelphia Press.

LEWISTOWN, Aug. 7.—Nearly full votes from forty counties, return but three Secessionists to the Legislature, but the disloyal counties are not yet generally heard from.—Well informed politicians think the Legislature in each House will be composed of seventy five per cent Union men.
