Election Proclamation. PURSUANT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," approved the 2nd day of July, A. D. 1839, I, ROBERT P. LINTON, High Sheriff of the County of Cambria, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, do hereby make known and give notice to the Electors of the County aforesaid that a GENERAL ELECTION will be held in the County of Cambria on the SECOND TUESDAY, being the 8th day of OCTOBER, A. D. 1861, at which time State and County officers will be elected, to wit:

One person to fill the office of member of the House of Representatives of the State of Pennsylvania.

One person to fill the office of Sheriff of said county.

One person to fill the office of Treasurer of said county.

One person to fill the office of Commissioner of said county.

Two persons to fill the office of Associate Judge of said county.

One person to fill the office of Director of the Poor and Relief of Employment of said county.

One person to fill the office of Auditor for said county.

The electors of the township of Allegheny to meet as follows, to wit: The electors of the district composed of that part of said township of Allegheny, beginning at the line dividing Blair and Cambria counties, at a point on the dividing line...

The electors of the district composed of the township of Blair, in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, to meet at the School House in Carroltown, in said township.

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The electors of the district composed of the township of Washington, to meet at the School House, situate at the foot of plane No. 4, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of White, to meet at the School House No. 1, in said township.

The electors of the district composed of the township of Yoder, to meet at the School House in Cambria City, in said township.

Also, that in the 61st section of said Act it is enacted that "every general and Special Election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment, until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed."

The general, special, city, incorporated district, and township elections, and all elections for electors of President or Vice President of the U. S., shall be held and conducted by the Inspectors and Judges elected as aforesaid, and by clerks appointed as hereinafter provided.

No person shall be permitted to vote at any election, as aforesaid, but a white freeman of the age of twenty-one years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and who has paid a tax, or has performed military or naval duty, or has been a member of the militia of the United States, between the ages of twenty-one and twenty-two years, and who has resided in the election district ten days as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote, although they shall not have paid taxes.

No person shall be permitted to vote whose name is not on the list of voters, unless he is a resident of the township, and he shall first produce a receipt for the payment within two years of a State or County tax, assessed agreeably to the Constitution and give satisfactory evidence, either on his own oath or affirmation, or that of another, that he has paid such tax, or on failure to produce a receipt, shall make a most forcible and solemn oath, that he is of age as aforesaid, and give such other evidence as is required by this act, whereupon the name of the person so admitted to vote, shall be inserted in the Alphabetical list by the Inspectors, and a note made opposite thereto by writing the word "Tax" if he shall be permitted to vote by reason of having paid tax; or the word "Oath" if he shall be admitted to vote by reason of such age shall be called out to the Clerks, who shall make like notes in the list of voters kept by them.

In all cases where the name of a person claiming to vote as found on the list furnished by the Commissioners and Assessors, or his right to vote, whether found on the accounts given him, or by any qualified elector, shall be in dispute, the Inspectors to examine such person on oath as to his qualifications, and if he claims to have resided within the State for one year or more, his oath shall not be sufficient proof thereof, but shall make proof thereof by at least one competent witness, who shall make such proof, as is required, of his residence, and payment of taxes as aforesaid, shall be admitted to vote in the township, ward, or district, in which he shall reside.

If any person shall prevent or attempt to prevent, any officer of any election, under this act from holding such election, or use or threaten any violence to any such officer, or shall interrupt or improperly interfere with the execution of his duty, or shall block up the window, or avenue to any window, where the same may be holding, or shall riotously disturb the peace of such election, or shall use or practice any intimidating threats, force or violence, with design to influence unduly, or overawe, any elector, or to prevent him from voting, or to restrain the freedom of choice, such persons on conviction shall be fined in any sum not exceeding \$500, be imprisoned for any time not less than one month, nor more than twelve months; and if it shall be shown to the Court where the trial of such offences shall be had, that the person so offending was not a resident of the city, ward, district, or township where the said offence was committed and not entitled to vote therein, then, on conviction, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine not less than one hundred, nor more than one thousand dollars, and imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two years.

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the Act first aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one Judge from each district, at the Court House, in the Borough of Ebensburg, on the 3rd day after the day of election, being Friday the 11th day of October, A. D. 1861, then and there to do and perform those duties required of them by law.

And further, if any Judge, by sickness or any unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or clerks of the election of the same district, who shall do and perform the duties of said Judge unable to attend.
