THE SILVER GREYS.—This company which is at present in quarters at Wilmore, in this county, will probably start for Camp Curtin, Harrisburg, the first of next week. Its ranks are now pretty near full, and new recruits are coming in daily. We have already stated that William Palmer Esq., of Wilmore has been elected Captain. To the citizens of Cambria, with nearly all of whom he is personally acquainted, it is unnecessary to say, that he is well worthy of the honorable position assigned him.
