We have no intention of going into an claborate reply to, or analyzation of the three or four columns of malicious slang concerning us, in the last Alleghanian. By doing so, we would extend more attention to the impotent malice of the old Mountebank than it deserves. We shall notice only one or two points which seem to merit some

consideration, and then dismiss the subject. With regard to the movement which was started last summer, for the purpose of procuring the destruction of this establishment by an infuriated mob, it is well known that it was carried on under the special patronage of old Barker. He was the soul of the movement, and it was not his fault that it failed. But it was well for him and his myrmidons that it did fail. If they had made the attempt, he and his cowardly crew would have met with a reception, the recollection of which they would have carried with them to their graves.
