Probable Evacuation of Columbus

CHICAGO, February 19.—A special despatch to the Times, dated Cairo, Feb. 18th says.

Col Buford, with a small force went down the river on a reconnaissance to-day, and when within four miles of Columbus a heavy cannonading was heard, not, however with any regularity.

Col Buford believed the affair to be that the rebels were dismounting guns and blowing up their magazine, preparatory to evacuating the place.

A large number of rebel prisoners were brought down yesterday. They belonged to the Cumberland river, and as they passed their homes they looked wistfully for some face of recognition.

Two thirds of them manifest a desire to return to their allegiance. Some acknowledge that they have huddled into their present unfortunate position.

Six thousand prisoners have already arrived here, and others will be brought down as soon as transportation can be procured.

A special despatch to the Tribune, dated Fort Donelson, Feb. 13th, states that two more regiments have been captured to-day in the East entrenchments, and a number have come in and delivered themselves up.

Many of the rebels threw away their arms, and large numbers were thrown in to the river. There are two water batteries, the upper one with a heavy rifled gun of thirty two pound bore, and two thirty two pound cannonades.

Two thousand barrels of flour, twelve hundred boxes of beef, and a large amount of other provisions were found to-day. All of to-day has been occupied in unloading the prisoners, gathering up stores and munitions, and burying the dead.

It is currently reported that Gen. Harris, of Tennessee, has ordered all Tennesseans to lay down their arms.
