ADDRESS

Of Democratic Members of Congress to the Democracy of the United States.

FELLOW-CITIZENS:

The perilous condition of our country demands that we should reason together. Party organization, restricted within proper limits, is a positive good, and in itself essential to the preservation of public liberty.
