Governor Stanley.

This newly appointed military Governor of North Carolina, and commissioned for that express purpose, clothed with all the authority of a civil and military officer, to fill vacancies, execute the laws, and encours age Union sentiment, has been most severely censured for closing a school opened by a Northern philanthropist for the education of colored children. The laws of North Carolina prohibit the instruction of Negroe, and cordingly closed the school. Thus, for doing exactly what he was sent there for, to see that the laws of that State were executed and obeyed, is most wantonly censured by the Administration, Secretary Stanton declaring that he "would not remain one "hour a member of an Administration which "sanctioned such proceedings as that of "Governor Stanley, and read his visitors the ·letter which he had just written that func-"tionary, after consulting with the President "in which he was directed to revoke the ob-"noxious law, and allow the schools to go "on as heretofore."

Governor Stanley's Administration so far has been a very successful one, in establishing order, and persuading many who had rushed headlong into rebellion to return to their allegiance. Thus it would seem that Mr. Stanley is not so strongly tinetured with Abolition, as to suit the Administration at Washington, therefore he must be severely taken to task for doing a duty for which he was expressly commissioned. This is not guilty, he being a native of that State, and a staunch Uni nist has, by his impartiality, succeeded in persuading numbers of the rebel slave holders of that State to return into the Union, thus arousing the fears of the Abolition party, that this war might be brought to too speedy a close, whence their iniquitious plunderings would be at an end. and their favorite enrancipation schemes
