AN ORDINANCE,

RELATING TO widening and straightening of certain parts of Main Street, and regulating of pavements in the Borough of Carrolltown.

Section 1st—Be it ordained by the Burgess and Town Council of the Borough of Carrolltown, and it is hereby ordained by the authority of the same, That it is necessary for the general improvement, and further benefit of said Borough, to widen Main Street, making it eighty feet wide, or as high this as the buildings on said street will permit, to be governed by the front walls of the present dwellings on the east side of Main Street, beginning at the Alley on the south side of John Platt's lot, and extending to Carroll Street, declaring public such property as had been heretofore considered private on the west side of Main Street, outside of a straight line, beginning at the north-east corner of I. E. Maucher's dwelling on the corner of Main and Carroll Streets, and extending south as far as the original plan of the street will permit retaining the width of eighty feet.

Section 2d—That that part of Main Street in front of Jos. Zolner's lot shall be widened, beginning at the south west corner of said Jos. Zolner's lot on the east side of Main Street, making it as wide at the north west corner of his lot as the house of the same will permit.
