

PROCLAMATION OF GOVERNOR CURTIN.

HARRISBURG, July 29.—The following proclamation has just been issued:—

In the name and by the authority of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Andrew G. Curtin, Governor of the said Commonwealth.

To sustain the Government in times of common peril by all his energies, his means and his life, if need be, is the just duty of every loyal citizen.

Enlistments will be made for nine months in the new regiments, and for twelve months in the old. The existence of the present emergency is well understood.

Let those who cannot go themselves contribute to provide bounties equal, at least, to those offered by the adjoining States.

To put down the rebellion is the business of every man in Pennsylvania, and her citizens will show on this occasion that they do not wait for the slow process of legislation.

The conduct of our men already in the field has shed immortal lustre on Pennsylvania. Let their brethren fly to arms to support them and make the victory speedy as well as certain.

I designate below the number of companies which are expected from the several counties in the State, trusting the support of her honor in this crisis, as it may be safely trusted, to the loyalty, fidelity and valor of her freemen.

Given under my hand and the great seal of the State, at Harrisburg, this 21st day of July, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty two, and of the Commonwealth the eighty seventh.

Executive Order.

First, Ordered that military commanders within the States of Virginia, South Carolina, Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Mississippi, Louisiana, Texas and Arkansas in an orderly manner seize and use any property, real or personal, which may be necessary or convenient for their several commands as supplies or for other military purposes.

Second. That military and naval commanders shall employ as laborers within and from said State so many persons of African descent as can be advantageously used for military or naval purposes, giving them reasonable wages for their labor.

Third. That as to both property and persons of African descent accounts shall be kept sufficiently accurate and in detail to show the quantities and amounts, and from whom both property and such persons shall have come, as a basis upon which compensation can be made in proper cases.

The Morgan Raid.

From the Cincinnati Commercial. BOYD'S STATION, SIXTEEN MILES North of Cynthiana, K., July 18th, 1 o'clock A. M.—A messenger from Cynthiana has just arrived here.

The train which left Covington for Cynthiana yesterday morning, with Capt. Wm. Glass and his company, and their 12-pounder aboard, reached the town between ten and eleven o'clock.

We have conversed with two intelligent gentlemen who were on the train—one a resident of one of the interior towns of Kentucky, the other the Messenger of the Adams Express Company.

The Kentucky gentlemen said there were several hundred men left to defend the town, but they were not well organized or armed. The Rebels first made their appearance on the river side of the town, about two hundred strong.

Of course it was incorrect as our informant saw him doing his duty after the story of his death was circulated. The Rebels fired hotly on the train, as many as fifteen balls striking it.

Our informant says the Rebels seemed making the attack systematically, and in pretty good order. The first detachment of them that appeared were on foot.

P. S. We have received a despatch from Boyd's Station, sixteen miles this side of Cynthiana, stating that a messenger arrived there at one o'clock, who had left Cynthiana at 8 o'clock.
