

Play-Soldiers. Our friend T. B. Thorp, in a letter from New Orleans, encloses to us the following amusing satire on play-soldiers—a printed morocca which he picked up while walking in the streets of that city:

CONSTITUTION OF THE SEA-COAST GUARDS, ADOPTED MAY 10, 1861. MOTTO:—"Prompt on duty."

Article 1. This company shall bear the name of the Sea-Coast Guards.

Art. 2. The number of the Sea-Coast Guards shall be from ten to five hundred, or more.

Art. 3. The entire company shall consist of officers, each member being entitled to select his own office.

Art. 4. This company shall repudiate all military rules and usages. Every member shall arm himself in his own way for active service, and hold himself in readiness to do as he pleases at an hour's notice from the commander.

Art. 5. The Sea-Coast Guards shall be commanded by each member in rotation, but it is left entirely at the option of the members to obey the orders of the acting commander or not, as they may please.

Art. 6. The Guards will parade semi-occasionally, or oftener—provided they have nothing else to do.

Art. 7. Each member of the Sea-Coast Guards shall, while in active service, draw the following daily rations: one bottle claret, one do. champagne, three fingers cognac, six do. bourbon, one dozen cigars, one boned turkey, one boiled do., one dozen broiled oysters, two dozen do. in the shell, one basketful of knick-nacks, assorted.

Art. 8. When on marching orders, each member of the Guards shall be allowed one boot-boy, one barber, one laundress, one carriage with two horses, one set of fishing-tackle, one pack of dogs at option, two double-barrelled shot-guns, one portable two-story dwelling-house, one library of selected novels, one dozen periodicals, and one traveling billiard-table.

Art. 9. Members are expressly forbidden to perform any duty contrary to their wishes, and any order which shall be given by an acting officer without its having been previously discussed by the entire corps, in debating society assembled, shall subject the officer giving it to be fined as much as he pleases to pay.

Art. 10. Members who have musical instruments are required to bring them into the field, but no two members shall play the same tune at the same time unless they please to do so.

Art. 11. The active duty specially assigned to this corps, by their own direction, shall be to treat and retreat.

Art. 12. Absent members shall be considered as present at every drill or roll-call, and respected accordingly.—Home Journal.

From Kentucky.

LOUISVILLE, Aug. 12.—A Nashville despatch from General Morgan, at Cumberland Gap, says: De Courcy's brigade and the 14th Kentucky, on the 5th or 6th inst., had a severe engagement with Stevenson's division in force the rebels lost 225 killed and wounded, and Lieut. Col. Gordon, of the 11th Tennessee, taken prisoner. Our loss is three killed, fifteen wounded and fifty taken prisoners. Two companies of the 16th Ohio were surrounded by two rebel regiments and cut their way out. We captured a large lot of forage, tobacco, horses and mules.

John Morgan left Knoxville on the 2d inst., with 2,000 cavalry, en route for Kingston. Kentucky is to be invaded.

Reports confirmed at headquarters indicate guerrilla raids upon Calhoun and Ramsey counties, on Green river, creating considerable excitement on the Indian border. The steamer Venango, hence for Cumberland river with sutlers' stores sunk at Seuffletown on Sunday.

MEMPHIS, August 10.—The Bulletin of this morning has advices from reliable sources which represent that General Breckinridge attacked Baton Rouge on Tuesday last and was repulsed, losing among the killed Gen. Clark, of Miss., and Col. Hunt, of Kentucky. Breckinridge attributes the defeat to the non-arrival of the ram Arkansas to make a simultaneous attack on the Federal fleet with his land attack. The Arkansas arrived in the evening and immediately assailed our fleet, destroyed two vessels, severely damaged two others, and drove the balance away.—Breckinridge renewed the attack from the land side, and is said to have captured the entire Federal force at Baton Rouge. It is also said that a large portion of Van Dorn's command is cooperating with Breckinridge for an immediate attack on New Orleans.

It is currently reported and credited at Helena that the rebels have completed the alteration of the Star of the West (which was up the Yazoo river) to a ram-gunboat, and that she is now at Vicksburg. She is called the Richmond, is clad with railroad iron, and mounts twenty-two guns. One of the ocean tugs up the same river, also completed, came out at the same time.

The New Orleans Bulletin of the 30th ult. announces the arrival of the flag-ship Hartford, and frigates Richmond and Brooklyn, from Vicksburg.
