Election Proclamation.

PRESIDENT to an Act of the General Assembly of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, entitled "An Act relating to the Elections of this Commonwealth," approved the 2nd day of July, A. D. 1859.

One person to fill the office of Auditor General. One person to fill the office of Surveyor General.

One person to fill the office of District Attorney. One person to fill the office of County Commissioner. One person to fill the office of Director of the Poor and House of Employment of said county.

The electors of the township of Allegheny to meet as follows, to wit:—The electors of the district composed of that part of said township of Allegheny, beginning at the line dividing Blair and Cambria counties...

The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Carrolltown, to meet in the School House of said Borough. The electors of the district composed of the Borough of Cambria, to meet at the Court House in the Borough of Ebensburg.

And I further give notice, as in and by the 19th Section of the aforesaid Act I am directed to do, that all persons, excepting Justices of the Peace, who shall hold any office or appointment of profit or trust under the government of the United States...

Also, in the 4th section of the Act of Assembly, entitled "An Act relating to elections and for other purposes," approved the 10th day of April, 1856, it is enacted that the following 18th section shall not be so construed as to prevent any military officer or borough officer from serving as Judge or Inspector at any general or special elections in the Commonwealth.

Also, that in the 61st section of said Act it is enacted that "every general and Special Election shall be opened between the hours of eight and ten o'clock in the forenoon, and shall continue without interruption or adjournment, until seven o'clock in the evening, when the polls shall be closed." The general, special, city, incorporated district, and township elections, and all elections for electors of President and Vice President of the United States, shall be held and conducted by the Inspectors and Judges elected as aforesaid, and by clerks appointed as hereinafter provided.

No person shall be permitted to vote at any election, as aforesaid, but a white freeman of the age of twenty-one years or more, who shall have resided in this State at least one year, and in the election district where he offers to vote at least ten days immediately preceding such election, and within two years past a State or County tax which shall have been assessed at least ten days before the election. But a citizen of the U. S., who has previously been a qualified voter of this State, and removed therefrom and returned, and who shall have resided in the election district, and paid taxes as aforesaid, shall be entitled to vote after residing in this State six months.

mited and not entitled to vote therein, then, on conviction, he shall be sentenced to pay a fine not less than one hundred, nor more than one thousand dollars, and imprisoned not less than six months nor more than two years.

Pursuant to the provisions contained in the Act first aforesaid, the Judges of the aforesaid districts shall respectively take charge of the certificate or return of their respective districts, and produce them at a meeting of one Judge from each district, at the Court House, in the Borough of Ebensburg, on Friday the 17th day of October, A. D. 1862, then and there to do and perform those duties required of them by law.

And further, if any Judge, by sickness or unavoidable accident is unable to attend said meeting of Judges, then the certificate or return aforesaid shall be taken charge of by one of the Inspectors or clerks of the election of the same district, who shall do and perform the duties of said Judge unable to attend.

Given under my hand at my office in Ebensburg, the 4th day of September, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and sixty two, and of the Independence of the United States the eighty-seventh.

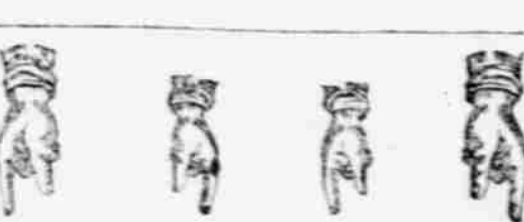
