

Gen. Burnside Does not Advance--The Army Short of Supplies and Means of Transportation.

Gen. Burnside does not advance--The Army Short of Supplies and Means of Transportation. Overst. FREDERICKSBURG, Stafford Co., Va., Nov. 25.

The army is not crossing swords with the enemy before the ordinary course of the campaign of the delay will be only that which has unjustly given Gen. McClellan the reputation of slowness--the fault of persons at Washington to send forward these things without which the army cannot move.

A contemporary correspondent has attached to attach significance to the fact that Gen. Burnside, more rapid than his predecessor, had moved his army from Fredericksburg while much was destitute of clothing. He was only the last of a very evident fact that the same army, with the same equipment, which General McClellan had moved from the Potomac to Warrenton, was now under the same circumstances as much, of postponing movements, necessary, in the forwarding of supplies, &c., from Washington.

All impatience for a move as are the people at home, we have been for eight months unable to do so because the pontoon bridges and supplies for men and horses had not been sent to us according to promises and promises. Orders for men's rations to the entire army were not sent a day or two since. It was impossible, and is impossible, to furnish the army with short of transportation.

The amount of forage exhausted is enormous, and thus far has not been sent in sufficient for present consumption. Captain Pitkin, deputy quartermaster at Belle Plain, issued yesterday 100,000 lbs. of forage, and his supply is exhausted. Belle Plain is not a suitable place for a depot. It is only four miles from headquarters, and has the advantage of being near the Aquia Creek, but the water is so shallow that boats can only come in during the high tide of the tides. Belle Plain is a beautiful plain, upon the right side of Potomac Creek, surrounded by hills which form a semicircle facing the river, a mile distant.

Steamers and schooners lie fast in the water at the entrance of the creek, waiting for the water allows them to pass up the wharf, which is built upon canal cuts, a dozen of which lie abreast to the river and support the timbers and planks over the water. Belle Plain is covered with grape wagons waiting for the supplies which cannot be brought from the boats to the shore.

It is useless to cover the anxiety which is felt concerning the result of the anticipated attacks. Every day of delay increases the difficulty, and makes the chances of success more dubious. The reports which covers up all information of the enemy, makes the prospect all the more delightful. With a river between us and the whole section surrounding an impassable line of pickets, the chances of obtaining information are extremely small. The efforts of spies are unavailing, and few are willing to try their hands at a halter for the tempting prospect of a successful tour among the camps would insure them at such a price.

These conditions at this signal station, which the flag which is kept there, observations, are comparatively unimportant. New lines of earthworks are being thrown up, and the rebels are apparently making use of their entire strength to prevent the success of our impending operations. Beyond a few uncertain reports, little is known of the strength of the enemy, his number of guns, or his position. A rebel signal station was watched yesterday, and our own men are able to interpret to some extent, the messages which they are sending. Nothing anything important was discovered, and I am unable to state.

The headquarters the reported arrival of the enemy was being pretty generally discredited. Having left the Shenandoah and threatened Sigel, he is now reported to be across the river at Fredericksburg. Like all statements at present concerning the enemy, we look upon it with some suspicion of its truthfulness.
