

Trial of the Indians in Minnesota.

The St. Paul (Minnesota) Pioneer, of the 17th, contains the following letter from a correspondent: CAMP SIBLEY, LOWER AGENCY, } November 7, 1862.

Our ambulatory military Commission, which commenced its sessions at Camp Release, for the trial of the "mulatto, mixed bloods, and Indians," engaged in the Sioux raids, has closed its labors and been relieved from duty.

Four hundred and ninety-eight cases have been disposed of, so you can see the calendar of the Commission was a formidable one.

At camp Release, or Sibley, a tent served for a court room, but here more comfortable accommodations were obtained in a log building, formerly occupied by a half breed named La Batte for unromantic kitchen purposes, but henceforth to pass into history and be immortalized. But to return to the Commission.

The prisoners were brought in, chained together by the feet, in pairs, in some cases eight at a time, and the charges, which were preferred by General Sibley, read to them through the interpreter Antoine Premier, and then after being exhorted to tell the truth, and not equivocate, each was asked as to the extent of his participation in the outrages, and, if necessary, witnesses were called against him.

It was proved on one old cut-nosed Indian that, on the occasion, he had shot a white man and butchered with his knife eleven women and four children, and an other, that he had killed nineteen.

Many of those engaged in the Parville murder had been tried. Patville started from Jo Reynolds's place, just above Red Wood, for New Cim, on the morning of the outbreak, with three young ladies and two other men, and on the way were attacked by the Indians.

The War in Missouri. LEAVENWORTH, Nov. 22.—A letter from Fort Scott, dated the 17th, says: The burning of Lamar, Missouri, has been confirmed. The wagon train, which was so anxiously looked for, has safely arrived at the fort.

Four men arrived here yesterday from below, who report that a train of two hundred wagons is on the way up, but is probable that the party will have to fight their way, the rebels being in greatly superior numbers.

St. Marys, Florida, Bombarded by our Gunboats. NEW YORK, Nov. 23.—The New York Herald has received a letter from Fernandina, Florida, of the 10th, giving an account of the bombardment of St. Marys, by the gunboat Mohawk.

The steamer Neptune, with a detachment of the 9th Maine, Colonel Rich, accompanied by the Mohawk, the troops landed, and were fired on by the rebels, one being dangerously wounded.

St. Louis, Nov. 24.—The Democrat has information that the rebels are now busy fortifying Port Hudson, 150 miles above New Orleans.

The rebels are now running steamboats from Port Hudson to Lake Providence, a distance of more than three hundred miles, and are also running boats on Red river, bringing immense supplies of cattle from Texas, and large quantities of salt from the new salt works on the Red river, about fifty miles above its mouth.
