The Latest from Murfreesboro—Our Loss Only 7000 Killed.

NASHVILLE, Jan. 7.—Our whole loss during the battle at Murfreesboro, in killed, wounded and missing, is not over 7000. The Rebel loss is estimated at from 12,000 to 15,000.

Our army is still chasing the Rebels, and our war is eight miles beyond Murfreesboro yesterday.

The Rebel General RAINES was buried here yesterday. No demonstration was allowed.

The bodies of General HANSON, Capt. TOMPKINS of the Sixth Kentucky, and Capt. FERGUSON of the Louisville Legion, were brought in to-day.
