

Pennsylvania Legislature.

AMENDMENTS TO THE CONSTITUTION. Mr. REX a joint resolution proposing an amendment to the Constitution, as follows:

Resolved, by the Senate and House of Representatives of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania in General Assembly met, That the following amendment be proposed to the Constitution of the Commonwealth, in accordance with the tenth article thereof:

FIRST AMENDMENT.

There shall be an additional article to said Constitution, to be designated Article XIII, as follows:

NEGROES AND MULATTOS.

Sec. 1. No negro or mulatto shall be permitted to come into or settle in the State, under any pretence whatever, after the adoption of this amendment to the Constitution.

Sec. 2. All contracts made with any negro or mulatto coming into this State contrary to the provisions of the foregoing section, shall be void; and any person who shall bring into the State, such negro or mulatto, or shall harbor, employ or otherwise encourage such person of color to remain in the State, shall be fined in any sum not less than \$100, nor more than \$500, and such additional penalty as the Legislature may by law direct.

Sec. 3. All fines which may be collected for a violation of the provisions of the preceding section, or of any law which may hereafter be passed for the purpose of carrying the same into effect, shall be set apart, and appropriated for the colonization of such persons of color, and for the removal and a maintenance of all negroes and mulattos who have come into the State previous to the adoption of this amendment, and since the commencement of the rebellion, unless it shall be proven that they are fugitive slaves, whose masters are not actively engaged in the rebellion, when they shall be returned to their masters, who shall, upon the return of such fugitives, pay all costs and expenses attending the same.

Sec. 4. The General Assembly shall have power, and is hereby directed to pass a law to carry out the provisions of this article at the next session after its adoption, and to provide for the removal and colonization of all negroes and mulattos who may be willing to emigrate.

The FRENCH IN MEXICO.—In political and diplomatic circles, writes "The Liberator" from Washington, speculation is active as to the policy of Louis Napoleon in regard to Mexico and the war in this country. No one undertakes to solve the question. Any one may form conjectures. All that he will throw out some clue to his designs very soon. Perhaps he did it on the New Year's Day. One thing is certain, that the French Minister here does not expect, at present, any interference at all from his Government in our affairs. Had neither he nor any one else can undertake to favour the designs of a ruler who is so violent, self-isolated and mysterious as Louis Napoleon.

Our most experienced military men, who have served in the Mexican war, says that the French army will not do much more and capture the city of Mexico. But these soldiers' opinions and statements are very uncertain. What will France do next? Will she set up a new government in which she can make a treaty, and a treaty which the new government will not be able to maintain after the French news shall be withdrawn? Or will she occupy the country, and establish over it French rule? There was a time in our history, when this government would, at least, inquire into the designs of the Emperor. Some may wish to do it now. But, so far as is now seen, the Federal Government will abstain from any interference in the matter, and even from any unnecessary notice of it.

WESTMINSTER, Jan. 22, 1863.—The latest of numbers started by a New York sensation paper, today, in reference to the Army, are full of lies. We have reports from your special agents to this morning, when no fighting had taken place, and no such rumors were in Washington until telegraphed from New York.
