HEADQUARTERS ARMY OF THE POTO-MAC, Wednesday March 18.—The first real cavalry battle of the war has been fought, resulting in a decisive victory on the part of the National forces.

The telegraph has informed you of the departure of a large eavalry force in the direction of Culpepper, to reconneitre, and, if possible, to intercept a body of rebels known to be in the neighborhood of Warthe men being much exhausted after their

The regiments chosen for this important enterprise were the First and Fifth Regulars, commanded by Capt. Reno the Thirty-fourth and Sixteenth Pennsylvania, Col. McIntosh: the First Rholl Island, Fourth New York, and Sixth Ohio, Col. Duffier; and the Sixth New York Flying Pattery, of six guns-all
