

And weereas, It is necessary and important to the inhabitants residing along and in the vicinity of the said road that it be ke, t in a condition to be traveled. Therefore,

SECTI N 1. Be if enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the Com monwealth of Pennsylvania, in General As sembly met and it is hereby enacted by an thority of the same, That it shall be the duty of the supervisors of each township, through which the Jefferson and Ebensburg Plank Road may pass, and they are hereby em be wer forthwith, to take charge of, and put in good order and repair, such part of said ships, and from time to time maintain and keep in on er, all such parts of said road, i the same manner as if the same were a county road, and in case of a failure to do so, shall be liable to all the provisions of law
