JOHN & CROSLY'S CARBON PAPER

The following acts, relating to Cambria county passed the House of Representatives, on the 31st of March last:

AN ACT relating to the Jefferson and Ebensburg Plank Road.

WHEREAS, The Jefferson and Ebensburg Plank Road, has been abandoned and no tolls collected thereon, for more than one year past.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That it shall be the duty of the supervisors of each township, through which the Jefferson and Ebensburg Plank Road may pass, and they are hereby empowered forthwith, to take charge of, and put in good order and repair, such part of said road as may be in their respective townships.

AN ACT declaring Burned Dam Run in the County of Cambria, a public highway.

SECTION 1. Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, in General Assembly met, and it is hereby enacted by the authority of the same, That Burned Dam Run, is hereby declared a public highway, from the point where it is now a highway, up to the forks of said Run, and from thence up the South branch of said Run, as far as Andrew Carl's saw mill, and up the North branch of said Run as far as the farm of Valentine Kries, Senior.

President's Proclamation a Day of Humiliation and Prayer.

Whereas, The Senate of the United States, devoutly recognizing the authority and just government of Almighty God in all the affairs of nations, has by a resolution, passed the President to designate and proclaim a day for national prayer and humiliation.

And whereas, It is the duty of us, as well as of men, to own their sin, and to confess their sins and transgressions to their Maker, and to receive his pardon, and to receive his grace, and to be renewed in the Holy Spirit, and to be made partakers of his mercy, and to be blessed with his love.

And, inasmuch as we know that His divine law, nations, like individuals are subject to punishments and mercies in this world, may we not fear that the awful calamity of civil war, which now desolates the land, and which is a punishment inflicted upon us, for our presumptuous sins, to the end of our National reformation, may be averted? We have been the recipients of the choicest bounties of Heaven.

Now, therefore, in compliance with request, and fully concurring in the action of the Senate, I do, by this my proclamation, designate and set apart the 30th day of April, 1863, as a day of National humiliation, fasting and prayer.
